TODAY'S PROGRAM

Barbara Rosen introduced member Bob Freelen who spoke of his experiences serving on the Sonoma County Grand Jury.

Bob graduated from Stanford and stayed for 32 years. He served on the Board there for 20 years and was looking for something else to do locally after he retired. When he received a flyer about the Civil Grand Jury, it looked like a good fit for him. He applied, was interviewed by the presiding judge of the Superior Court and was accepted. He gave us the



history of the Grand Jury which started in England in 1176. Each of the 58 California counties has a Grand Jury and the one in Sonoma County has 19 members. Its function is to serve as an arm of the Superior Court for civil matters only. It is a watchdog looking after city government, weighing misconduct by public officials. Each member of the Court takes an oath of confidentiality for LIFE. There can be no bias or conflict of interest by the members. It is the members who bring forward subject matter forward for the Jury to consider. Citizens can also suggest subjects using the Jury website of which there are about 20 per year. The website also shows who the members are and prior decisions. **Bob** had to review Jury decisions of the past 20 years and issue a report. Of the six reports issued last year, the subjects included homelessness, planning and coroner investigations. **Bob** gave details of the inner workings of the Jury, which are considerable. The Jury is made up of a diverse population, except for age. Because of the time needed to devote to the Jury, members are mostly retired and older in age. **Bob** had a ride along with a County sheriff which was peaceful. Most of the work is done by the foreperson and pro-tem member which is very time-consuming. The Jury has no powers of enforcement and if the County board disagrees with a decision, there is no enforcement. Members serve one year, but they can ask to stay on. There are no term limits. As for pay, **Bob** receives \$15 per meeting and \$12.50 for committee meetings, plus mileage. There are ten alternates to fill in when a member is absent. **Bob** has found that the Supervisors are politically motivated but all others are open. He has found that Jury members are thoughtful and thorough. It is clear that **Bob** has found this opportunity very rewarding.
