TODAY'S PROGRAM: Live Zoom Presentation from the Rotary Club of Zaporizhzhia, Ukraine.

Cathy King and Andy Elkind introduced the members of the Zaporizhzhia Rotary Club to us stating that they were taking a huge risk to be with us so late at night their time. **Cathy** thanked Pat Williams for making the initial contact with the club and said their club is appreciative of our help where aid is needed. Three women led the discussion, two named Oksana and one named Valentyna.



Zaporizhzhia is one of the largest industrial cities in

Ukraine and has the second largest hydroelectric dam in the country. It is in the south-eastern region of Ukraine, about 2 ½ hours from Mariupol. Its population is more than 700,000. The women showed us photos of their beautiful city and invited us to come visit when the situation improves over there. Because they are so close to Mariupol, where the Russian "invaders" have been brutally bombing the city, they have many refugees passing through their city. So, far Zaporizhzhia is not occupied by Russian troops, although their nuclear power plant, Enerhodar, is under Russian military control. They stated that so far, there have been over 2,788 civilian casualties in Ukraine, 1,081 killed including 109 children. This number is fluid, and they expect more casualties as the war continues. Over 10.2 million people have been displaced with over 3.7 million crossing international borders. Because Poland has taken in so many refugees, the women said we could also aid the Rotary in that country, if needed.

The Zaporizhzhia Club supports the children's unit in a TB clinic in the city and continues to support them during this crucial time. The children stay anywhere from 6-12 months in treatment. They also support talented young pianists.

Support during the war: The women said there are several areas we can help support. Multipurpose cash assistance, medical equipment, medicine, the TB clinic, and food supply all need assistance. It's crucial for displaced people to have access to food, shelter, and safe water. They said we could transfer monies to United for the Future or to Rotary Clubs in Poland to help them purchase items for refugees. Our club decided that sending monetary support to be used as



needed would be our best option.

Dave Anderson suggested we print the children's calendar the women shared with us and sell them here in town to help raise money for Ukraine. The club will look into having them printed as soon as possible.
