Guest Speaker: Rollie Atkinson Title: Local News: Past, Present and Future



Dr. Dave Anderson, who was one of four other current members of the club when Mr. Atkinson joined the club in 1982, introduced the speaker. Originally, Mr. Atkinson was a journalist in Maryland and moved to Healdsburg in 1982. Although he was looking for another type of work here, he decided to take the job as a sports editor for the Healdsburg Tribune. Subsequently, he covered local politics and

eventually became editor of the paper and went on to be a general manager. He bought the Sebastopol newspaper, Sonoma West Times in 1995. He then bought the Healdsburg Tribune and Windsor Times in 2000. His last purchase was the Cloverdale Reveille, the Cloverdale newspaper, in 2013. In June 2021, he launched SoCoNews which is a digital news source. In September 2021, he gave the ownership of the four newspapers and SoCo News to a non-profit

organization, Sonoma County Local News Initiative. During his career, has strived to keep alive the local newspapers. He just retired last month.

Mr. Atkinson related much of the history of his involvement with the Healdsburg Tribune as a reporter, editor and manager. He relayed many colorful stories which occurred during his time here in Healdsburg. Some of the stories related to how an "old-time" politician controlled what stories were printed in the Tribune. He relayed stories from the owner of Dry Creek Winery that in 1976 there was only one traffic light in the city and there were no wineries that had wine tasting rooms. He relayed the evolution of the Rotary Crab Feast which started just with the crab dinners. It improved dramatically with respect to fund raising when the auctions became part of the Crab Feast fundraising event.

He talked about the changing landscape of local, traditional newspapers, many of which have ceased to exist because the traditional business model is "dead." 2,000 newspaper companies have gone out of business nationwide in the last 10 years and jobs in the traditional newspaper business has dropped from 60,000 to 30,000 in the past 8 years. Reasons include advertising dollars going to companies like Google and Facebook, news cycle now being 24 hours which fits the digital platform better than the traditional newspaper model, and the large proportion of the public believing that the news should be free and gets it via newsfeeds and social media. The survival of legacy newspapers like the Healdsburg Tribune is in question. Mr. Atkinson believes that it will take a forward-looking business model these newspapers to survive. A non-profit organization which will incorporate philanthropy, grants and other forms of underwriting may be such a model.

Mr. Atkinson relayed one major personal concern with respect to the city of Healdsburg. He says it is a great city with service clubs, non-profit organizations, restaurants, music, arts, museum, etc. but Healdsburg is no longer a "hometown." The cost of living is too high and the next generation cannot afford to live here. He feels that this is a "historical inflection" point. It will be a challenge to move Healdsburg back to more of a "hometown."

To a question about high school students and journalism, Mr. Atkinson said there are many bright interested students going into journalism and enrollment is full in many of the top colleges. Most are going into digital media news as opposed to the traditional newspaper companies. He is encouraged by this trend of increasing interest in journalism

Finally, with respect to saving the local newspapers, he said only the community can save it.
