## TODAY'S PROGRAM

Alliance Medical Center: Susannah Labbe, CEO, and Barbara Boylan, M.D., staff cardiologist. Our member, **Phil Luks**, is Chairperson of the Board of Directors for Alliance Medical Center. Phil provided a full and meaningful introduction of our guests, and the institution itself.

It's important to note here that our club and its members have been closely involved with the

Alliance Medical Center (Alliance) since its inception. The late great **Max Dunn**, past club president and long-time club secretary, was one of the founders of Alliance. Club member and past president **Dave Anderson**, M.D. was also closely involved with Alliance through the years. Club member **Tom Cleland**, D.D.S., worked closely with Alliance in its quest to provide dental care to needy children. Club member **Jack Neureuter** was CEO of Alliance some years back. And, of course, member **Phil Luks** is chairperson of the board, while Dena Cochran, wife of member **Dick Cochran**, is soon starting to serve on the Alliance board. A close alliance indeed, between our club and Alliance.

The Alliance Mission: "Improve the health & wellness of our diverse communities. We healthcare services."

Today, through three primary care clinics in Healdsburg and in Windsor, Alliance supports more than 12,000 patients each year, most of whom are hardworking agriculture, retail or hospitality workers and their families. Fully 25% of patients are uninsured because their employers do not offer health insurance or the insurance is not affordable.

Trained and licensed medical, dental, and behavioral health professionals, the large majority of whom speak Spanish, staff the Alliance clinics; Alliance also offers interpretation services as







needed to best communicate with patients. Services are provided to anyone regardless of ability to pay and regardless of insurance/no insurance or Federal status. All in the community are welcome to receive the variety of services offered.

Some salient facts and figures:

- Alliance has four locations, two in Healdsburg, and two in Windsor
- Alliance has recently been recognized nationally as a High Quality of Care organization
- 40,000 doses of Covid vaccines have been provided since 2/6/2021
- Alliance continues to distribute Covid prevention material
- Flu vaccines are offered to the entire community, not just Alliance patients
- Our Rotary club helped Alliance acquire a hand-held ultrasound device, which Dr. Boylan displayed to the group. It's called a Point of Contact Ultrasound Device, or POCUS. Dr. Boylan expressed her appreciation to our club, and said she uses the POCUS often to detect medical problems in patients



• There is an active OB/GYN group within Alliance. Approximately 250 babies are born here each year.

This was a very good presentation, providing our members with important education about this terrific organization.
