*After his State of the Union address President Biden's overall job approval rating rose to 47%, up from 39% the previous week. 52% said they approve of how Biden is handling the war in Ukraine, up from 34%. 69% say they support sanctions against Russia, even if it results in higher energy prices.

A nine-year-old Brazilian boy snuck on a plane for a solo 1677-mile journey, after doing an online search for "how to get onto a plane unnoticed. He was reported missing after his mother woke up and found him gone. The family spent the day searching for him before getting a call informing them he was in Guarulhos on the other side of the country. His mother said, "He boarded the flight without documents, with nothing" his mother said. Authorities are still investigating.
