WHAT WAS IT LIKE 100 YEARS AGO?

- *The average life expectancy for men was 47 years.
- *Fuel for cars was sold in drug stores only.
- *Only 14 percent of homes had a bathtub.
- *Only 8 percent of homes had a telephone
- *There were only 8,000 cars and only 144 miles of paved roads in the nation.
- *Maximum speed limit in most cities was 10 mph.
- *The average US wage in 1910 was 22 cents per hour.
- *The average US worker made between \$200 and \$400 per year.
- *A competent accountant could expect to earn \$2,000 per year.
- *A mechanical engineer about \$5,000 per year.
- *More than k95 percent of all births took place at HOME.
- *Ninety percent of all Doctors had NO COLLEGE EDUCATION! Instead, they attended so-called medical schools.
- *Sugar cost four cents a pound, coffee was fifteen cents per pound.
