ROTARY is at the forefront of efforts to fight other diseases and improve health worldwide. According to WHO, indoor air pollution caused 4.3 million deaths per year. To help combat it, members of the ROTARY Club of Taos-Milagro, N.M. mobilized ROTARY clubs in several countries to support the Himalayan Stove project, which has installed more than 3,000 clean burning stoves in Nepal. In Tamil Nadu, India, ROTARY clubs partnered with clubs in Maryland to use a Foundation global grant to purchase a large van and outfit it with X-ray equipment to screen women for breast cancer in hard-to-reach communities. The "Mammobus" has been used to conduct more than 2,500 free breast cancer screenings, and has helped detect and treat early-stage cancer in six women. In Seattle, ROTARY members are putting millions of pounds of fruits and vegetables that would otherwise go to waste into the hands of those who need them through ROTARY First Harvest. By giving to the ROTARY FOUNDATION, your dollars have a much greater impact. And friends of ROTARY respect that the FOUNDATION puts their gift to great use."

This was the 39th year that a ROTARY float has been in the Tournament of Roses parade in Pasadena. This year's float theme was "Changing Lives Through Clean Water."
