### **ROTARY NOTES**

Recently on NBC, "Rock Center with Brian Williams" presented a story about exchange students sexual in the United States. The U.S. Department of State has assured us that ROTARY was not one of the programs of concern.

ROTARY and all members of the exchange committee including local exchange officers take their role very seriously when it comes to caring for exchange students. We bring them into our community and watch over them closely and are available to help at any time day or night because we live in the same community as the inbound students.

Unlike ROTARY, other organizations that host J-1 Visa students are allowed to have placement coordinators that live far from inbound students. In fact, the Department of State allows inbound students to live up to 120 miles away from their coordinator. No wonder some students have felt alone...it's because they HAVE been alone.

ROTARIANS are in favor of strict guidelines with exchange students, even it if means that additional volunteers are needed to carry them through.

The NBC feature put exchange programs in a potentially negative light. You should be aware of ROTARY's position on exchange students in case you are asked about it from friends and neighbors.
