The Rotary Club of Atlanta Legends Award is given to people who go above the normal definition of success



Applicants Welcome for GSE Trip to Taiwan (D3460)

Each year the Rotary Clubs of Georgia sponsor an international experience through Rotary's Group Study Exchange (GSE). This fall, four young professionals from South and West Georgia and the metro Atlanta area who are NOT Rotarians will be selected to travel to Taiwan along with a Rotarian Team Leader. In a departure from past practice, this year's exchange will concentrate on one of Rotary International's six Areas of Focus: Basic Education and Literacy. As always, the exchange is based on building relationships one-on-one and it offers special cultural experiences in addition to the opportunity to experience how another culture provides the critical element of education to its youth. All District 6900 Clubs are encouraged to nominate Rotarians as potential Team Leaders, and Non Rotarians (including Rotaract members) in the Club area as potential Team Members. Applications are due September 30.

The trip is for four weeks during March 2013to Rotary District 3460, the area in and around the second largest city, Taichung. While some limited personal expenses are expected, the major travel expenses are provided by The Rotary Foundation, with the food, housing, and local transportation provided by Rotarians and their families in Taiwan. The Rotary Foundation: Doing Good in the World By Ray McKemie, District Foundation Co-Chair



It's hard to believe that two months of this Rotary year have passed. Wow! Time does really fly when you are having fun!

August was another wonderful month for Rotary and the Rotary Foundation. At the Rotary Foundation Seminar in Columbus, we recognized new Major Donors, Bequest Society members and outstanding PolioPlus clubs. Clubs completed submission of their applications for District Grants on August 31st. A numbers of clubs continue their work on a total of twelve Global Grants. And the Group Study Exchange (GSE) and Scholarship committees are moving toward interviewing team members and scholars respectively in the near future.

District Grants give districts and clubs the flexibility to carry out small relatively short term projects to support the mission of the Rotary Foundation. District Grants are funded with up to 50% of the DDF available in a given year. In the current year, they will be available to fund at least one grant per club to support programs and activities in their local communities, one GSE team, and disaster relief as necessary during the year. Districts must submit an application to the Rotary Foundation for approval prior to receiving the DDF disbursement for the year. Typically, our District applies for these funds in September. The Foundation normally reviews and approves the application and sends us the DDF in October.

As mentioned previously, District Grant fund our GSE team each year. GSE is a long-standing program of Rotary International to promote international understanding through one-onone relationship building. The teams spend about four weeks in the other country as guests of clubs in the District. Team members are hosted by Rotarians

in their homes and escorted to various locations and events where they can have firsthand experience with the local culture, history, politics, and business practices. This year's team will travel to Taichung, Taiwan and have the opportunity to see how education policy impacts teaching practices and methods in Taiwanese schools and how the educational system in that country has produced outstanding results, especially in science and math.

Global Grants support large international activities with sustainable high-impact outcomes in one or more of the six areas of focus and have a long-term impact. Global grants must be sponsored by two Rotary clubs or districts: a host partner in the country where the activity takes place and an international partner outside the country. At this moment we have seven grants in process in the countries of Honduras, Botswana, Serbia, Swaziland, Ecuador, Nigeria, and Guatemala with three others being prepared. We have funds available to support additional

Global Grants are be used to fund Scholarships. The intent of these graduatelevel scholarships is to fund sustainable, highimpact outcomes in one of Rotary's six Areas of Focus: peace and conflict prevention/ resolution, disease prevention and treatment, water and sanitation, maternal and child health, basic education and literacy, economic and community development. Our 2012-13 scholar, Erika Larson of Atlanta, departs this month to pursue a Master of Science in Public Health from the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine. Having observed the devastating effect of HIV/AIDS during her childhood in Botswana, Erika would like to return to public health area and design programs that take advantage of the bestpractices learned at the London School.

But, none of this happens without your contributions to our Foundation. Rotary's strength lies in its members. Members who since 1905 have donated over \$2 billion to help people in need around the world. Members who have volunteered their time and money to help immunize billions of children against poliomyelitis. Members who have cared enough to take the risk to make a difference in the world. Members to whom we owe our deepest gratitude for what they have done and for what they will continue to do to help others have a better quality of life. Please make time in the near future to evaluate how you might help Our Foundation to continue doing good in the world with your time, your talents, and your resources. 

Alpharetta Rotary Proudly Supports the Troops

After September 11, 2001, the **Alpharetta Rotary Club** made a commitment to support our men and women in uniform by recognizing the sacrifice they make for our nation. The club began sending care packages in 2003 and hasn't stopped since - supporting the Army, Marine and Air Force units. The units who receive care packages have been referred to the club by a member, neighbors of members and returning veterans. Sometimes the point person in the combat theater

has a local Georgia connection.


The club supported parts of the Georgia 48th Brigade during its deployment to Iraq and Afghanistan and is currently adopting two combat units from the 4th Infantry Division serving in Kunar Province,



Afghanistan. One of the Platoon leaders for these units went to Sequoya High in Cherokee County and is a North Georgia College graduate as well. Care packages are usually sent starting in June and then every three or four months. The last set of boxes went out in this July.

The boxes generally include toothpaste, toothbrushes, mouthwash, and sunblock, soap and lip balm. Food is popular, so the club includes canned fruit, all kinds of nuts, candy, cookies, ready-to-eat tuna lunches, beef jerky, raisins, drink mix and slim jims. A football, playing cards and a poker set finish the package. Veterans have said that there are periods of intense pressure and boredom and the food and games help their morale.

The soldiers sometimes send thank you notes back to the Alpharetta Rotary Club as well as a US flag that was flown over a combat base. The correspondence received from the units is always from the heart. Through its fundraising efforts the Alpharetta Rotary Club has committed a good portion of its budget to support our soldiers. "We appreciate William Perkins taking charge of this very important project for our club and we plan to continue supporting our troops in the future," said club president Bill Weeks.



The **Vinings Rotary Club** had the most successful 5K race ever on Saturday, August 18, as over 1600 runners ran the 5K downhill race and over 100 children ran the one mile fun run to help raise money for the club's charities. It is estimated that over \$100,000 has been raised for the Vinings Charity Fund, the Good Samaritan Health Center of Atlanta, and the Calvary Children's Home.
