#### **Last Week** by Janice Jacoby

Last Tuesday's speaker was Judge John Delaney. He is a retired judge but serves as a visiting judge and spends time in Mediation and Arbitration of civil and family disputes in numerous Texas counties. He was raised in Houston, is a Navy Veteran, a Rotarian member, a father of 4 and a grandfather to 4. Judge John Delaney has seen a lot in the judicial system and wants people to start "Reconsidering the War on Drugs."

He took us through the history of how the "war on drugs" started during the Nixon administration with the Shafer commission. He also informed us how marijuana is just a plant and how he believed it should be treated the same way alcohol and drugs are treated. Dr. Delaney believes he was tough on crime as a judge, but that instead of being so tough America needs to be more smart on crime. His belief is that it is our right, duty, and privilege to question our government, and he is on different groups voicing his opinion on how we should be reassessing this war.

Dr. Delaney's words were meant to make you reconsider your thoughts on this "war." Marijuana has many good medicinal uses for people with illnesses and should be more readily available to those people. Dr. Delaney still believes there is a challenge with other drugs but wants to start with easing up on marijuana, and getting people to see his view. What are your thoughts?

#### Congratulations!!

Of the seven Districts in Zone 21B, <u>District 5870 clubs are setting the pace</u>. As of February 28th our clubs have given a total of \$287,969 to the Annual Programs Fund (APF) which is a 30% increase over last year's total at this time, and is currently leading the other Districts in the Zone by a substantial margin.

Eights months into the year we already have 1319 EREY Donors which is nearly 50% of all Rotarians in the District, and 723 Sustaining Members. Additionally, we have 63 new Benefactors, 7 new Bequest Society Members, 11 New Major Donors, 4 Major Gifts, and 53 new Paul Harris Society members.

Rotarians in our 64 clubs are to be commended for this significant accomplishment in just the first EIGHT months!! We still have 4 months to go and with your continued leadership and your commitment to the work of the Rotary Foundation our clubs will do even more for this noble cause.

It's nice to be number one at this juncture, but it's much nicer and more rewarding to know that the Rotarians in D5870 truly understand the fabulous and wonderful work being done by our Rotary Foundation to improve lives around the world, and to truly provide Peace Through Service.

## What is Wasrag?

The Water & Sanitation Rotarian Action group was formed in 2007 as a group of Rotarians, recognized by Rotary International, focused on water & sanitation work.

Rotarians are uniquely qualified to deliver sustainable solutions. They understand the culture and values of the local communities to which they belong. They are attuned to political considerations and can pinpoint problems before they become hurdles.

The world is discovering that effective programs take 3 to 5 years to be sustainable - local community engagement and appropriate technologies are keys to success. Solutions need to consider complex realities: geography, geology, climate, local culture for example. Ensuring a project is based on best practices isn't easy, requiring skills often not readily available to Rotary Clubs.

Wasrag was created to provide the know-how, consistency and credibility essential to success over the long term. This has come together in a program called "Start with Water".
