Today is the anniversary of the end of the Federal Republic of Central America when it declared independence from the Spanish Empire in 1821.

Those federated states became **Costa Rica**, **El Salvador, Honduras, Nicaragua** and **Guatemala. Mexico**, to their north declared its independence on the following day and they all celebrate their **Independence Days** this week.

Guatemala was the centre of the Mayan civilisation which was fragmented when the Spanish invaded in the early 16th Century. Over the next two centuries they removed huge quantities of gold, silver and gems back to Spain. Napoleon attacked and weakened Spain and Portugal in the Peninsular War from 1807 to 14. The next 20 years saw them driven out of South America and all of the new nations were established.

Dictatorships, foreign interference and civil wars, especially from the USA were endemic in all of these countries until, in 1996 democracy finally stuck in Guatamala. It is still however, beset with high crime rates and poverty but at least they are independent and free.

Gualan is a port city of 45 000 on a river in the inland, half way between the Pacific and Atlantic Oceans.

The **Rotary Club of Gualan** was Chartered in District 4250 in 2001 and has 18 Members led by **President Victor Cordon**. They are currently building a class room at a neighbouring village school under their Rotary District Ripple Effect Program.

"One on One": David Rees talks with Robbie

David came to Australia in 1964 as a child aged 11 from Hastings, Sussex. He and his family were £10 Poms.

He wanted to be an electrical engineer so he attened a technical school in Melbourne. When his family moved to Sydney he went to Macquarie HS, not a tech school but it had tech subjects. His career goal turned to teaching.

He went to Bathurst Teachers College and was out at his first school aged 21 at a one teacher school. He recalled his first day as a disaster...little kids couldn't read cursive, so he had to write on his blackboard in cursive and capitals. He also ejected a person from the school, not knowing he was a Deputy Director of Education.

Eventually David transferred to Mt Druitt. He married and had two children, now 40 and 36. He has a grandchild, "Chrispy".

David's final school was Mittagong, where he taught for 12 years. Kids he taught years ago still call him Sir.

He's glad to be out. There's too much paperwork now and his beloved blackboard has been replaced with a dreaded smartboard.
