For the immediate future, the style of meeting is a bit uncertain. It depends on how many people are coming.


Please bear with Rod and Trevor for now. Some meetings may be via Zoom.

INTERNATIONAL TOAST

The Indonesian islands have been inhabited for thousands of years. From the second century AD they were ruled by Hindu and Buddhist Kingdoms until the spread of Islam saw them transformed by the 13th Century into Sultanates.

In 1602 the Dutch East India Company moved in and essentially took over government and commerce with Europe until it became bankrupt and the Dutch Monarchy took it over as a colony in 1800.

A strong independence movement had developed during the 20th Century which was assisted by the Japanese invasion in 1942 which ejected the Dutch. Part of the political movement worked with the Japanese while the rest established an underground.

When the Japanese surrendered on 15th August, 1945 they were ready and Sukarno declared independence on 17th August. The Republic of Indonesia was confirmed on 17th August, 1950 and now is a stable democracy of over 270 million people a short boat trip to our north west.

Bandar Lampung is a port city of just over one million on the southern tip of Sumatra.

It is served by the Rotary Club of Bandar Lampung which was Chartered in District 3410 in 1984. **President Linda Melati** leads 29 Members.

They have two continuing projects which meet objectives of the Rotary Foundation in education and health.

They provide advanced books through the Rotary Reading Centre Foundation in local village schools and build small toilet buildings in the villages which otherwise have no sanitary facilities.
