# International Toast- given by Pres. Leigh

While working on the Tulip Time gates, I met the **President Elect of the Rotary Club of Thamel** which has its home in Kathmandu in Nepal.

His name is Suresh Man Shrestha, and he is in Australia on holiday. He is the Chairman of the Public Service Commission of Bagmati Province which includes Kathmandu and stretches across the country from the Indian to Chinese borders.

Nepal has a population of over 30 million and has been inhabited for thousands of years. Gautama Buddha, founder of Buddhism was born in the south around 500 BC.

The country became a kingdom in 1768 and allied itself to Britain in India but was never colonised. It and its mountainous terrain served as a barrier to Imperial China. It became a democratic republic in 2008 after the monarchy was overthrown in the Nepalese Civil War.

The Rotary Club of Thamel was Chartered in 2002 in District 3292 and has 39 Members currently led by Pres. Krishna Man Ranjitkar.



Several years ago, the Club assisted in establishing a biogas electricity generation project at Asrang in the south which provided power for 30 houses. It grew to supply 125 houses but was damaged earthquake and the Club is now assisting in funding repairs.

Other projects include a girls' education program and raising goats for poor village families.

# International Polio Day – 24th October



Pres Leigh reminded members of the upcoming Polio Day reporting that new cases had occurred in America, but these were not of the dangerous "wild" variety. The 2021 report states,

"So far in 2021, only two cases of wild polio have been reported — the lowest circulation of the disease ever — with one infection each in Afghanistan and Pakistan, the two countries where polio remains endemic".

## **Guest Speaker:**

Will Eddowes introduced our guest speaker Libby Henderson, assisted by her husband James who is also her partner in Big Purple Phone, - the topic of tonight's presentation.





Libby is one of the founding members of the digital design community in Australia. She was on the team that build the first version of Commbank's Netbank and the Comsec share trading website in the 1990s. She has worked in London and the US on brands such as GE, Sony, Compaq, Nestle, Rothschild and others throughout a 30-year career. Libby was an adviser to the PM the Hon Scott Morrison for strategic digital communications and literally wrote the book on all things digital having written the curriculum for Digital Marketing for OpenColleges.

James Henderson started out his IT career as a telecommunications engineer and spent 25 years with Telstra Bigpond and NBN systems.

In a world were 1 in 4 seniors are socially or physically isolated, and more than half give up on technology as they age, the Hendersons have made it their passion to make technology much, much more user friendly so we can all stay at home safely for longer and remain connected to those we love.

## **Libby Henderson**

Libby commenced her presentation by enlarging on the pair's experience in the technology industry and how they had come to form the BigPurplePhone company.

The Hendersons say BigPurplePhone was the result of being separated from their parents during COVID-19 lockdowns. Libby's 85-year-old mother Janette couldn't quite navigate video

calling and options for a phone that she could use were limited.

"That was the catalyst that inspired us to create the BigPurplePhone," Libby said.



The BigPurplePhone is specifically designed for older people struggling with technology, they say it's simple enough to be used by dementia and Alzheimer's sufferers.

The price of the base model BigPurplePhone is \$699 outright.

The phone is based on the Nokia smartphone with the software written and tested by the Hendersons and sold to be used on the Telstra partner network.

The phone is designed to eliminate features such as touch not swipe, no lock on the phone and no data stored on the phone. All features that make the phone easier to use and less prone to difficulties in use. A major feature is that it operates on a restricted virtual network of family and friends which is managed by a member of the network, effectively a client 'carer'. The screen icons are large and readily recognisable by ageing eyesight.

The Hendersons are based in the Southern Highlands from where support for the phone is managed.

Considerable interest was shown by the questions at the end of the presentation, and Pres. Leigh gave an appropriate vote of thanks which drew appreciative applause.
