INTERNATIONAL TOAST

The Republic of Armenia celebrated its independence from the USSR in 1991 last Tuesday.

The nation of 3 million people is landlocked in the Caucasus region between the Black Sea and Caspian Sea. It is bounded by Turkey to the west, Georgia to the north, Azerbaijan to the east and Iran to the south.

Armenia's history as an entity dates back to 2 500 BC and has had many forms from kingdoms to a Soviet Socialist Republic and supplicant state of the Roman Empire and a dozen others.

It was the first declared Christian nation in 301 AD and, although it now has only one tenth of the land area of its peak it is still Christian and a thriving multi-party democracy with a high standard of living.

We toasted the Rotary Club in Yerevan, the capital, a few years ago so this evening we will toast one of the other six Clubs in Armenia.

During the First World War the Turks killed over a million Armenians as they cleared them from their homelands in eastern Turkey in a genocide the Turks still deny and the Armenians won't let them forget.



The **Rotary Club of Gyumri** was Chartered in District 2452 in 1998.

Gyumri is in the north west of the country only 10km from the Turkish border. Prior to 1988 the city had a population of over 200 000. The Spitak earthquake of magnitude 6.8 occurred at the end of that year. This is similar to the one in Victoria last week but its epicentre was about 50km from Gyumri on a major tectonic plate line and only 5km deep. The surface shift along the fault line was up to 1.5 metres. Around 50 000 people died.

Much of the city was destroyed and the population has declined to 112 000.

The Club has 21 Members led by President Vahagn Ghukasyan.

They are continuing supporters of End Polio Now and run Blood Donor Days and assist in maintaining the National Bone Marrow Registry.

In recognition of the Independence Day of Armenia would you please join me in our International Toast to the President and Members of the Rotary Club of Gyumri.

Journalist (IL) added: The international toast was followed by a heated debate of the definition of landlocked and whether this applied to Armenia. Bowral High School – Robbie Allen.

- Interact has been meeting on Zoom due to the lockdown. Robbie has not been able to attend as only those with an Education Dept. email address are able join in.

- The school has received a \$5,000 grant for Breakfast Club kitchen equipment.

- Brian Ritson talked about the Duncan Hill barbecue at the Bowral Golf Club. Nothing firmed up yet and very dependent upon Covid19 health rules. Brian is in negotiations but the Golf Club needs to have a Covid19 plan first.

BlazeAid – Don Graham,

- Don reported from the Graham Caravan which has been Chris and Don's abode while they are helping at the Bega BlazeAid centre.
- Bega Valley Shire is all open and not in lockdown. Don's even had a haircut.
- They need volunteers as soon as possible as funding finishes at the end of the year and this is the last BlazeAid site to be running nationally.
- When they started they had 300 jobs but they are now down to 52 which they are trying to finish before Christmas.
- Don said that he applied for an Authorised Worker permit which was approved and allowed him to travel beyond Wingecarribee Shire LGA and set up in Bega Valley Shire. There is no minimum stay required but Don said at least a week would be needed to have any effect.

Guest Speaker – Brian Ritson on the Topic of Snakes.


• Denise Coad introduced our own member Brian Ritson who used to be a local snake catcher. Brian wants the past tense to be emphasised there.



- Brian then gave a fascinating and informative talk on catching snakes especially in the local area.
- He told us about the different types of snakes. Blind Snakes are rarely seen and live underground; Pythons are nonvenomous; Colubrids are not considered dangerous as their fangs are located at the rear of their mouth although some are venomous; Filesnakes are aquatic and non-venomous; Elapids are the frequently largest and most encountered, all are venomous to some considered dearee but are not dangerous to humans. The remaining are the most deadly in the world and they are the Front Fang snakes.
- Brian explained about a rating system giving a score based on venom toxicity, venom yield, fang length, temperament and bite frequency. The maximum score is 25 and Brian listed snakes ranging from Taipan rated at 21 down to Red Bellied Black rated 9 or Small Eyed snake rated at 6.

- He explained about how the venom is measured using the LD50 scale of the 50% lethal dose amount needed to kill 50% of mice into which the venom is injected. A common Black Snake (aka Red Belly) has a LD50 of 700 whereas the Inland Taipan has a rating of 218,000!
- Over 80% of bites occur when trying to kill or catch a snake. Also 80% of locals have never seen a snake in the Southern Highlands.
- Brian recounted one job he had been to in Hill Top where a family had an outside Spar Tub. They had an electric insect zapper which killed insects in sufficient quantity to encourage frogs to sit under it for an easy take away meal. However the frogs were also a tasty meal for snakes. Brian found the copper head was nesting in the children's toy box!
- Brian's late wife Judy did a nursing course about snake bites when he took up the role of snake catcher. He described the symptoms you get if time goes by before medical help arrives from headaches, vomiting, and transient hypotension in less than an hour to paralysis of large muscles and limbs and progressive loss of respiratory muscle functions if it's more than 3 hours.
- Brian explained about the local common snakes but snakes can arrive from anywhere if they get caught in a vehicle for example. Brian had an inland taipan in a load of timber from Queensland which arrived when he was building in Hill Top.
- Early remedies were numerous and sometimes drastic such as application of native herbs, animal excreta, barnacle juice and holy water. Also eating the snake's venom gland, amputation of limbs with an axe and injections of ammonia or strychnine or even pouring gun powder onto the wound and lighting it. [Sounds like cures Trump would recommend].

What you should do is not to panic, keep calm, send for help and bandage semi constriction over the wound and 200mm above and below the wound. Rest stay immobile and try and elevate the wound. The snake is more afraid of you and there has only been one death locally in recent years.



President Will thanked Brian for his professional talk and once again demonstrating the hidden talents our Club Members have. John Hoelle added some of his experience of similar work he did in Queensland.
