International Toast - given by Ian Johnson

Bastet was the ancient Egyptian goddess of protection, pleasure and good health. In imagery she had the head of a cat and body of a woman and would ride through the sky each day with her father Ra, the Sun God. After dark she morphed into cat form and guard her dad from snakes while he slept.

Ian told us this because yesterday was International Cat Day and to remind us that cats were worshipped as Gods, and they have never forgotten it.

One of the Egyptian centres of cat worship was Memphis near to Giza, which is nowadays a suburb of Cairo, a city of 10 million people on the Nile.

The Rotary Club of Giza Karnak is one of 125 in Egypt and serves the communities of southern Giza. The Club recently took part in the restoration of a derelict school where the 34 Members created a new playground within the courtyard walls of the Mazoura School, celebrating



its opening with their District Governor. It was a welcome addition for the families of Mazoura and is becoming the centre of revival of shopping and commerce in the town.

The Club was chartered in 2010 in District 2451 and its President is Ahmed Nour, also a cat lover.

Ian invited us all to raise our glasses in recognition of International Cat Day and make a Toast to the President and Members of the Rotary Club of Giza Karnak.

Announcements:

President Leigh:

1. Public Sundials Survey

Bowral Public School has a current project surveying where there are public sundials in the Southern Highlands and has asked Rotary to let them know of any sundials that we are aware of in the area. If you know of any, please tell Leigh.

2. U Turn the Wheel

Rotary Club of Moss Vale has asked whether anyone can help them with their U Turn the Wheel project for high school students. There is a variety of dates as Sue Tyler has advised that UTW is on again after the Covid interruptions but under different arrangements. This year the course will be run at the various schools rather than the Mittagong RSL Club. Rotarians will assist wherever possible. Dates so far seem to be

3. Platy-Project Month of Action

Ophelia Davenport from the Australian Conservation Foundation (Australia's national environment organisation https://www.acf.org.au) has written to Rotary to let us know about a big nature project coming up that she would love Rotary District 9705 groups to consider taking part in. It's surveying platypuses as part of the Platy-Project Month of Action. In the month of September they are trying to get as many people as they can to head down to their local creek or river, find a quiet place on the bank, try to spot a platypus and record what they see (or don't see).

President Leigh who is also on the D9705 Environmental Envoy Team is liaising with the Team Leader PDG David Brawn to see how we can help. How does this help the platypus? Even though the platypus is one of our most unique and iconic animals, there are big gaps in our knowledge about the creature, including where it lives and how big platypus populations are. With platypus numbers declining, the lack of existing platypus data is a huge barrier to getting the protection it needs from extinction. ACF has been working with researchers at the University of NSW to try and fill this data gap along the east coast of Australia, but we really need help from lots of people in the community. Groups could get involved by doing some platypus surveying events sometime in September. Surveying can also be done individually. ACF has developed easy to use toolkits and an interactive map to make the process really simple. Not only would it be helping nature, but it's an easy, and relaxing activity that can bring the community together.



4. Food and Wine Festival – 29th and 30th October Moss Vale Showgrounds

Last time we were invited to help with the gates and the parking for which we were paid because the RFS had been prevented from community involvement during the pandemic. Whether we are invited again this year or not is unknown but Leigh said consideration needs to be given to whether we run a Poffertjes Stall again. This year Des will not be available and last time there was another stall selling Poffertjes which seriously restricted our sales.

5. Bong Bong Picnic Races - Friday 18 November Parking is in hand with Don Graham. Ian Johnson volunteered to manage the BBQ.

Further information about Cherry Tree Hill and an ancient Rotary project was provided by Ken Adams who described the site as the hill on the Country Club Golf Course that can be seen from the Bowral/Mittagong main road.

6. Rotary Tea spoons.

7. Zone 8 Regionalisation Project:

President Leigh attended one of the information webinars and as he promised last week he now has the wording of what we are going to vote on. Our region, or Zone 8, which includes Australia, New Zealand, and the Pacific Islands, has been selected as one of two potential regions from across the globe to pilot a regional approach to governance. This vote is to decide whether to go ahead with the pilot change or stay as we are. The wording of the vote is "This Club approves participation in a pilot to develop, test and evaluate a new regional approach to supporting and governing Rotary and Rotaract Clubs and members in Zone 8 from July 2023 to June 2026." Club presidents will vote on behalf of their club and assuming two-thirds of the clubs in the district vote in favour of the Regionalisation Project, District Governors will be asked to endorse the proposal.

As Governors are the officers of Rotary International and will play a critical leadership and advisory role during the pilot, their vote indicates their commitment. For more information see,

Guest Speaker: Viv May Administrator for Wingecarribee Shire Council



After dinner, **Trevor Fair** introduced and welcomed **Viv May**, Administrator for Wingecarribee Shire Council. Viv May is a highly qualified Local Government Administrator with over 40 years of local government experience including 27 as General Manager of Mosman Council. Viv's special interests in local government include waste management, sustainability, international strategies, service delivery reform, and effective stakeholder engagement. In 2021 Viv was appointed as Administrator for WSC following the suspension of the Councillors. Viv is expected to remain in this position until 2024.

Viv was awarded the Public Service Medal for service to the Mosman community in the 1999 Australia Day Honours List.

Viv gave a precis of his background, his time with Mosman Council and in 2016 Strathfield asked him to sit in as GM, the Auburn Council, then Cumberland Council where he was there for 18months. Out of the blue the Government asked Viv to go to Armidale and then March 2021 to Wingecarribee Shire Council.

The appointment of Viv May as an Administrator for Wingecarribee Shire Council followed the suspension of the Councillors by Minister for Local Government, Shelley Hancock in March 2021. In September 2021, the NSW Government announced that a Public Inquiry would be held into Wingecarribee Shire Council. Shelley Hancock, has also suspended the councillors, reappointed the interim administrator and deferred the 4th December 2021 council election until the public inquiry was completed.

On Thursday 14th July 2022, the Minister for Local Government, The Hon Wendy Tuckerman, announced that she has accepted the key recommendations from the Commissioner's report.

Mr Viv May PSM will remain at Wingecarribee Shire Council until the local government election in September 2024.

Viv formed the view that the Council was a debacle and had been in a bad way long before 2016. He saw that restoring public confidence was most important. He found a culture of ego, entitlement and personality with a "who you know" not a "what you know" as the basis for decisions. Councillors used code of conduct as a weapon against other councillors.

Viv described the difficult process of getting an independent General Manager. Council had a favoured person and this influenced the recruiters. Viv made the recruiters start again and he is very pleased with the appointment of Lisa Miscamble. Lisa has extensive experience in local government, most recently as General Manager at Hunter's Hill Council as well as executive roles at Campbelltown, Camden, Canada Bay and Marrickville Councils and she has moved to the Southern Highlands to take on this role.

Commissioner Ross Glover issued the Public Enquiry 259 page report which was scathing of the Council and the Councillors and made 9 main recommendations. The report can be seen at

and the recommendations are on the last 15 pages from page 245.

The Enquiry was a huge drain on the staff. The Commisioner requested 4,000 folders and 26.000 pages of documentation. Viv has taken on board all the recommendations from the enquiry. He also sees work either started or in the near future will include restructure of the council, land use planning, planning for the current population of 52,000 rising to 66,000 by 2041. Also the Moss Vale bypass which will reduce traffic volume on Argyle Street by 30% and work on flood mitigation to reduce Mittagong Creek volume

by 40%. Viv wants to see kerbside collection to be continued and extended, the Station Street upgrade completed and more housing.

Viv's talk was packed with information, it was lively and he was a very convincing speaker. He recommends we look at the Commisioner's report and the recommendations. Many other documents and reports can be found at
