President Don Graham called the meeting to order and welcomed the guests attending: Guest Speaker Steve Pettaras and his wife Rebecca Pettaras, Janine Brundle, Julie Alison and Robyn Liberale.

Don invited Vanessa Aylett to recite the Invocation and then deliver the International Toast.

International Toast.

The eleventh of February is the National Foundation Day of Japan. This holiday, based on Shinto mythology dating back to 660BC, had been an occasion for propagandizing the divine origin and superiority of the Japanese race with heavy emphasis on militarisation.

Consequently, at the surrender by the Japanese at the end of World War II, the chief of the occupation authorities' religious and cultural resources division recommended the abolition of the holiday to General Douglas MacArthur because of the issue of militarisation.

After the occupation by the Allies concluded there were several attempts to reinstate the National Foundation Day, and this occurred through legislation in 1966 to "Nourish a love for the country by commemorating the establishment of the country".

When you visit Japan today, mix with its people and stand in awe, admiring the beauty, the culture, the cleanliness, the creativity, the friendliness, the politeness, and the orderliness, you wonder how that country deteriorated as it did and its participation in World War II.

Kyoto is a city expressing each of those elements with its Temples and Shrines and of course the quaintly named Philosophers Path lined with cherry blossom trees, so magical in spring.

Kyoto is the home of the Rotary Club of Kyoto, chartered on 24th December 1925. It has a current membership of 194 and meets at the Kyoto Hotel.

In 1940 there were 48 Rotary Clubs in Japan and through political and right-wing pressure The Rotary Club of Kyoto was disbanded on 21 August 1940. However, the power of Rotary is strong and on 28 August 1940 there commenced the "Wednesday Club" meeting held at the Kyoto Hotel on what was the usual Club meeting night which enabled relationships and the Rotary ethos to be maintained.

Sir Angus Mitchell, the first Australian to be elected as the RI president in 1948-49, is credited with the reestablishment of Rotary in Japan after the end of World War II.

The first meeting of the Rotary Club of Kyoto was held on 23 March 1949 and the Rotary International charter was re-granted on 5 April 1949 with the same charter number as before, Number 2184.

Please be upstanding and toast the Rotary Club of Kyoto, its President Takahisa Takeda, and its membership of 194 Rotarians.





Don Graham reported that Rod Aistrope, Robbie Allen, and he had met Professors Hanneke Brouwers & Sietske van de Worp from Windesheim University of Applied Science in the Netherlands. They are planning to bring out a couple of students sometime between August 2024 and January 2025. Ian Donges held one of his popular Tim Tam quizzes. The answer was Coonabarabran which was correctly answered by Jim Gasson.


Don Graham explained that as Dream Cricket is so vulnerable to the weather when we hold the Gala Day at the Bradman Oval it is proposed to hold separate sessions at each suitable local school. These would be schools with sports hall or undercover areas that could be utilised if it is raining or very cold. First a pilot session will be tried out at one of the schools to see

how successful the concept is. Due to weather (and Covid19 restrictions) it has meant we haven't had a proper Dream Cricket Gala Day for a few years.

Guest Speaker:

After Dinner, **Steve and Rebecca Pettaras** were formally introduced by **Allan Falvev**.

Steve thanked the Rotary Club for inviting him to present Alka Power. Steve stated that Alka Power is Australia's number 1 alkaline spring water brand, bottled at the source in the Southern Highlands where we draw natural spring water and infuse it with unique ocean minerals such as Oyster Shell and Coral. Then Steve did his demonstration with three samples of water by dropping some drops (of something??) into the samples. The high alkaline (pH 9-10) sample turned blue, the acidic sample (pH 5) turned yellow and the very acidic sample turned white.

Back in 2012 when Rebecca and Steve started the journey with Alka Power, retailers as well as consumers didn't really understand about high pH 9-10 alkaline water.

At the beginning it was very hard to get the messaging across on the benefit of drinking Alka Power, so they came up with the idea to take it to the people. Seeing retail, buyers, the only way to get the message across was to do his wacky professor demonstration just like he did a moment ago. They went from delivering 2 to 5 boxes to stores to now on average 140 to 190 pallets per month.

Alka Power is now the exclusive hydration partner for Tough Mudder, Spartan (outdoor) obstacle races held in Picton and nationally as well as the Bowral Classic. They also sponsor local events such as Angels with Wings and Festival of Lights.





They are a proud partner of The National Breast Cancer Foundation and last year they donated over \$119,000 for cutting edge Breast Cancer Research.

Their carbon footprint is also something that they are so very proud of. As they draw spring water on site as well as blowing their own BPA free bottles in house. This is saving on unnecessary truck movements. Steve showed a sample "preform" which when expanded turns into a 1.5 litre bottle. A pallet of 9,000 preforms turns into 13 pallets of bottles.
