International Toast: Jo Chalmers

You can be forgiven for missing it but yesterday was **Commonwealth Day** when the 56 Members of the Commonwealth around the world acknowledge this loose association of mutual interest in peace, democracy, and the institutions of government.

The largely peaceful decolonisation of the British Empire from the start of the 20th Century was recognised at the Imperial Conference in 1926 by the establishment of the British Commonwealth of Nations. It has evolved to include 15 Realms including Australia, New Zealand and Canada, 36 republics including India, South Africa and Barbados and 5 other monarchies including Eswatini (formerly Swaziland) and Tonga.

While most members were part of the Empire several which were not former British colonies have joined. The first of these was **Mozambique**, a former Portuguese colony.

There was a war of independence from 1964 to 1975 when finally, the Portuguese abandoned their Empire but a series of civil wars continued until democracy was finally established. Mozambique joined the Commonwealth in 1995.

Mozambique is being hit by Cyclone Freddy which originated off the northwest coast of Western Australia 35 days ago and has crossed Madagascar and been in, out and back into Mozambique. It is the longest, most energy intense tropical storm ever recorded.

The country is low lying with the Zambesi and Limpopo Rivers running across it. It is a poor country which has in recent years had floods, droughts and famine, - an enormous challenge.

The three Rotary Clubs in the country will be out there supporting their communities at the grass roots level.

The Rotary Club of Maputo was chartered in 1990 in District 9400 and has 20 Members led by President Brian Holmes. They have a lot of work ahead of them.

In recognition of Commonwealth Day and the struggle of the people of Mozambique at this time Jo invited all present to rise and make our International Toast to the **President and Members of the Rotary Club of Maputo**



Jenette Stiles was introduced by Will Eddowes

Jenette Stiles is the Chair of the Southern Highlands Symphony Orchestra Inc. Her husband Dr Allan Stiles is the Musical Director.

Jenette's career background was in Finance, having held senior management roles at the National Australia Bank and JPMorgan in Australia, USA, and the UK.



Since then, her volunteering has included the Fund-Raising Committee for the "Dress for Success" project in Sydney, the Salvation Army Advisory Board Risk Sub-Committee), Girl Guides Australia Financial Advisory Board, the Wingecarribee Adult Day Care Centre, and the Community Technology Creativity Centre Inc. (CTC) in Robertson. She also served as Chairperson of the board of Friends of The Beecroft Orchestra for five years.

Jenette's current passion is the Southern Highlands Symphony Orchestra Inc. where she has been Chairperson since the orchestra's inauguration in 2014.

When Jenette and Allan returned to Australia they decided to settle in the Southern Highlands. Allan went to a birthday party where he met Roma Dix OAM (a well-known Southern Highlands figure who is currently the Orchestra Manager). As a result of this contact and the interest shown by other musicians at the party, in September 2014 Jenette and Allan started the Southern Highlands Symphony

Orchestra. The orchestra started with about 300 people in the Bowral Memorial Hall, which became its home until the Council decided to refurbish and improve the Hall. It hopes to return to the Memorial Hall later this year.

The Orchestra performs four programs (2 days each) per year. There are now over 60 musicians ranging from students to retirees, professional and non-professional. The company offers bursaries to help students. Older adults get lessons and support.

It is a community orchestra, not for profit and relies on sponsors, grants, and ticket sales.

The Southern Highlands Symphony Orchestra is running a competition for an original orchestral work, sponsored by one of their distinguished patrons, Ann Carr-Boyd AM. The winning composition will be performed at the SHSO Concert Series in September 2023. The criteria is on the web site and includes the requirement that the entrant must live in the local area. The closing date for competition entries to be received is 30th June 2023.

Jenette's retirement to the Southern Highlands has been taken over 24 hours day with her passion for the Orchestra which has turned out to be so important to the community. She wouldn't have it any other way.

Jenette concluded by showing a short video and answering questions.

Rod Aistrope gave the vote of thanks and presented Jenette with a certificate of the Club's donation to Australian Rotary Health, given in her name.
