Jenner deliberately exposed master Phipps to cow pox, and then on 1 July to small pox. As anticipated, and to his great relief the boy did not develop small pox.

MEMBER TALK: DAVID PATTON - PART ONE!

Rotary Bowral-Mittageng Rotary

I have found this quite a challenging exercise – what do you say, where do you start, what would be of interest?

I sometimes ask my older patients to do a biography as it is a very powerful tool to reflect on your experiences, what you have achieved, and how you got through past challenges and how you can bring resources together to meet current difficulties.

The famous life span psychologist Erick Erickson said that people in late adulthood 65+ reflect on their lives and can feel either a sense of integrity or a sense of despair.

People who feel satisfied with their accomplishments feel a sense of integrity, and they can look back on their lives with few regrets. However, people who are not satisfied with this stage of life can focus on the woulda, shoulda and coulda and feel bitterness, and fall into depression and despair.

So hopefully I'm in the former camp.

I apologise in advance tonight if I say anything that might offend.

I come from a typical pioneering family that populated the central West of NSW in last 25 years of the 19th century. Great grandfather Alex grew up in the Kelly country in Northern Victoria and actually attended school with Ned and Dan Kelly. Younger sister Kate Kelly was left in the Patton family's care when the gang raided Jerilderie over the border in NSW in 1879.

My grandfather Frank Patton tells the story when he arrived in the district in 1895. I thought this might be of interest to you Bob as it's a gold mining story.

"We left Parkes in July 1895, arrived at Alectown and camped at Stumpy Gully, one mile south of the village. After unyoking the bullocks and spreading the tarp down for tea, a Gold-digger who had been drinking heavily at one of the local hotels came on the scene at the time in a bad way.

He asked for a butcher's knife to cut his own throat, but Dad, being a hard case and to humour him, said no, don't take your own life, give me ten shillings and I'll hit you on the head with an axe. But the chap would not have it on and eventually made for his own camp.

His

mates found next day that he'd hanged himself in his shaft, using his braces for the purpose. Afterwards the lead was known as The Last Kick.

I grew up on family farm Pine Hill at Alectown West, attended the local one teacher primary school at Alectown that dad and my grandfather attended and then went to the local high school at Parkes.

Ive had the benefit of a loving and stable family, have been married to my wife Liz for 43 years and she wanted me tonight to acknowledge her support which I gratefully do.

I have one son Tom, daughter in law Rebecca and two grandsons and another on the way.

We have two whippets. Winnie and more recently Wally the pup.

However my life and career has not been without its ups and downs and challenges. Career wise Ive always been a bit of a risk taker and prepared to step out of my comfort zone to seek new challenges.

When I look back, each of these challenges has changed me in some way hopefully for the better – made me more resilient and a more compassionate person. Luck has also played its part in helping me fall back on my feet when things havnt worked out.

The 70s - university and first job as psychologist

I had a bad motorcycle accident when I was 18.

I had finished school in 1970 and I had just commenced a Commerce/Law degree at UNSWs new law school when I went back to the country to pick up my motorcycle.

On riding my newly repaired bike back from the mechanics shop at Forbes the engine seized and the car following ran over me. I spent 3 months in Orange Base Hospital.

The good thing was a year later I went back and enrolled in Arts Law majoring in psychology.

A few years later at the court case against the repairer I was offered \$20000 settlement on the first day but the barrister advised to decline. The next day my major witness the mechanic who inspected the repair failed to turn up and the case thrown out of court.

I had six months fill in before I could start my honours year in psychology having dropped the legal studies.

This worried my parents who encouraged me to apply for a government job.

I applied for a graduate clerk position and was invited to attend and interview for a psychologist role with the RAAF at Wagga.

Recall going for the interview with panel of Air Force office and Director of Psychology with long hair and a string bag. They asked me how I felt working for the RAAF and I replied I wasn't a pacifist if that's what they were concerned about.

Got the job. Found out later they couldn't get anyone to take the job and because I came from the country they thought they would give me a go.

Lived in the officers mess for 2 years.

Moved back to Sydney Recruiting.

Didn't have to worry about political correctness

The 80s – moved to Canberra

Moving to Canberra initially with the RAAF as a psychologist but then in various public service departments in the staff development and training function. At the end of the 80s leaving the public sector to try my luck in the private sector.
