International Toast.

Rod Aistrope then delivered his own International Toast to the Rotary Club of Odessa.



After the Second World War **Ukraine**, like all of eastern Europe was forced into the Soviet Union when the Russians refused to return to their own borders from the lands occupied during the war.

Ukraine regained its freedom and independence with the collapse of the USSR and its break up. Since then Russia has continuously attempted to impose itself on the country to keep it in its sphere of influence.

In 2013 the new illegitimate President Victor Yanukovych refused to sign a political and free trade agreement with the European Union and announced his intention to drag the country back towards Russia with economic and military ties. Massive street protests with loss of life followed as the people refused to return to Russian domination.

Next week the Ukrainian people will celebrate the *Revolution of Dignity* of 2014 which resulted in the president fleeing into Russia where he remains in exile.



Two weeks after he was deposed Russia invaded and still occupies Crimea.

4 weeks after that separatist movements started civil wars in two provinces in the east of Ukraine bordering Russia which has armed and supported insurgents. It was over one of these areas that the Malaysian Airlines Flight 17 was shot down.

As part of this unrelenting program to reestablish control over their territory the 41 million people of Ukraine now face the threat of invasion. The world waits to see where this will go from here.

There are 62 Rotary Clubs in Ukraine which, with Belarus is in District 2232. All were established after the fall of the Soviet Union.

On the south coast on the Black Sea is the third largest city in Ukraine, Odessa with a population of just over a million.

The city is served by the Rotary Club of Odessa which was Chartered in 1995. It has only 9 Members who are led by President Oleksii Tishchenko.

Would you all please give thought to the people of the Ukraine who are facing such a terrible threat and raise your glasses and make our International Toast to the President and Members of the Rotary Club of Odessa.

1. Food and Wine Festival: 26th & 27th February (Sat/Sun)



lan Langford distributed the roster requesting members to complete as many of the 32 shifts as each could manage for the weekend SH Food and Wine Festival being held at the Moss Vale Showgrounds at the end of next week. (An updated roster was distributed to members by email following the meeting). Ian has produced a short description of the duties we have been asked to provide:

There will be one entry gate to the festival and everybody will have prepaid on line so there is no cash or EFTPOS and all that is required is to scan their entry ticket. The gate will have 2 tents or marquees each with two volunteers scanning the tickets and handing out a plastic wine glass. It will be quicker than the usual paying procedure and promises to be a slick fast operation. The club will be paid for this work.

There also will be parking with entry by a gold coin donation. What we collect is kept by the Club. We will need one person at the Car Park entry with a bucket to collect the donations & two (or if available three) people to direct cars to form up the parking rows.

The festival is open from 11am to 6pm on Saturday and 11am to 5pm on Sunday. The roster has allowed an extra 15 minutes at the beginning of the first shift and an overlap at the changeover between the shifts.

Please be generous with your time & feel free to volunteer for both days or for a full day & if your spouse/partner wants to help please consider this.

7.A RAWCS project for 2022 - Olkola Aboriginal Cultural Centre



Rod addressed the meeting with an early proposal for consideration by the Club.

Covid has caused all overseas Rotary Australia World Community Service projects to be suspended until further notice ruling out a trip away to the Pacific again this year meaning 3 years in a row without a fix.

From our enquiries I understand that the Koroipita Village Project in Fiji, to which we have sent four teams over the last decade, is planning on commencing new house construction later in the year but the pandemic situation will dictate whether a Team will get there and when. It is a possibility.

Those of us who love to get away on a building project helping people less well off than us are missing these trips BADLY.

So we have been looking to a remote area project within Australia in an aboriginal location where we can do something that will bring benefits to our own people and satisfy our need to build.

PP Robert de Jongh has enquired of his daughter Clare in her role in the Public Service in Canberra as to opportunities and her enquiries through her work has put us onto a potential project in conjunction with the Centre for Appropriate Technologies Ltd., based in Alice Springs.

The Centre, CfAT has a track record of providing appropriate, generally low tech, low maintenance solutions to problems in remote aboriginal communities dating back to 1980. Their website at https://cfat.org.au has their story and achievements.

CfAT has provided information on three projects on Cape York Peninsula in Queensland. All three have aspects which are suitable for us to attempt. The largest is at Dixie, about 300km by road and about 200km northwest of Cooktown. It is right in the middle of the peninsula and it is remote.

The project is the Olkola Cultural Knowledge Centre where the traditional custodians of the area, the Olkola people building a facility to teach their customs to new generations and to the public. There is already a Ranger Station and the roof of the new Centre has been erected. They own 900 000Ha of freehold land and jointly manage two national parks.

The Project includes working with the Olkola Rangers in construction of timber framed and clad kitchen, ablution and other buildings, the Cultural Centre Building and erection of a 9m steel lattice tank stand with tank and plumbing and electrical rough in (and fit off if we have the right skills), etc. Skills transfer will be a spin off benefit of the Project.

Extensive planning, concept and more detailed drawings have been produced pro bono by the large engineering consultancy Arup and much of the funding is already in place. Their program has these buildings going ahead in June and July this year and it is expected that it might require a number of Teams working consecutively to complete the work.

Assistance with airfares, food and accommodation is available should we wish to take it.

The other two are smaller mainly ablutions, communal space and a Ranger Base building and may be easier for us to undertake with our normal Team skills levels.

The question is, are we interested. Interested enough to form a Team of between 6 and 10 of practical hands on people, not necessarily all with trade skills but with the ability and willingness to do building stuff and the durability to see out 2 weeks in the winter tropics. We may also need a licensed plumber and electrician to finish off.

If you are interested please email me back and if there are enough starters we can try to put a Team together, get more details and make a proper plan.
