

Notes for RCBM meeting 16 April 2024

Sergeant Ian Donges introduced the Honorary Members who are our guests, Michael Lendrum, Mary Ramsay and Ray Coulton and also introduced Robyn Luciano before handing over to President Don Graham.

President Don welcomed the honorary members and introduced the International Toast.

The International Toast was read by Will Eddowes – prepared by Rod Aistrope



Those who watched Australian Story on ABC TV last night will be aware of a quietly spoken unsung hero named Professor Arnold Dix who grows fruit and other things on his block near Monbulk in the Dandenong Ranges east of Melbourne.

He grew up curious. Interested in rocks, he studied science and qualified in geology and geophysics and then a Masters in engineering science and a PhD in civil engineering. He first worked at Ranger Uranium Mine in the Northern

Territory where his reports critical of the operation and the Regulator over waste water pollution saw him run out of town.

So he did a law degree. As a barrister specialling in environmental law and backed by his engineering and science and humanitarian instincts he became an expert sought after to explain disasters and accidents especially where loss of life had resulted. He investigated and provided expert advice on the Waterfall rail accident, a traffic tunnel fire in Melbourne, the Grenfell Towers cladding fire in London, the tunnels under the World Trade Centre after 9/11 and many others. His involvement in one problem on the Qatar Football World Cup construction program led him to spend 8 years there advocating for the thousands of immigrant workers trapped into slavery on the many projects and totally changed the conditions for foreign workers. Last year he was called in to lead the recovery of 41 workers trapped by a collapse of the roof of the Sikyara

Tunnel 500 metres into the foothills of the Himalayas. With a lot of teamwork, innovative thinking and above all his exemplary leadership all 41 men were rescued without further injury and no loss of life.

He is President of the International Tunnelling and Underground Space Association and a Member of the Bar of the High Court of Australia.

Australian Story is an excellent program and this was yet another inspiring story.

There doesn't appear to be a Rotary Club near the tunnel site in Uttarakhand in north India so tonight we will recognise Arnold Dix's local club, the Rotary Club of Monbulk and District where he recently gave a speech on the tunnel rescue.

The Club was Chartered in 1971 in District 9810 and has 13 Members led by **President Helen Reithof**. Hopefully they will be able to rope Professor Dix in to make it 14.

In recognition of the extraordinary achievements of their local boy would you all please rise and make our International Toast to the President and Members of the Rotary Club of Monbulk and District.

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President Don advised that we have been offered a movie night at the Empire on the 16 May We have the potential to make good money but there's a catch. We have to get enough people to fill the seats! **Mary Ramsay** has liaised with the cinema and urged all members to get at least three or four others to join the audience. The film is **The Way, My Way** about an octogenarian walking the Camino Track. It's billed as one of the best movies about the Camino. **Leigh Robinson** has offered to collect the money and coordinate.

President Don is proposing a donation to **Kids in Care** and suggested \$3000. **Rosemary Kelly** thought \$5000 would be more appropriate and this appeared to have general support. A decision will be finalised at the next Board meeting.

President Don also proposed a \$1000 donation to End Polio Now. This attracts a further \$2000 from the Gates Foundation. To be progressed at the Board meeting.

Dinner was served including a delicious rack of lamb.



lan Langford asked for everyone to complete the Science and Engineering Challenge roster with a 'Yes' or 'No' on their availability. We still need more volunteers and Ian wants to identify anyone who has still not seen the roster.

Tim Bowland was grateful for a few volunteers to distribute letters for new residents in the Southern Highlands, inviting them to be a Rotary Volunteers. Tim reported that six people had responded so far to a Facebook ad for Rotary volunteers. He also reported that a reference had been prepared for Asher for Oxley College. **President Don** congratulated Tim for his initiative.

Rod Aistrope introduced the three honorary members. Rod has been in our club for 25 years, come September, and therefore has known many past members.



Michael Lendrum was in the club for 23 years up to 2020 and during that time has been a willing volunteer on many projects. A keen vintage motor cyclist, he makes parts for himself and other enthusiasts. He was involved in building the weird vehicles for the Mad Max films. Michael says he now works part time for Mitre 10 delivering landscape supplies – often to multi-million homes in the area. He said he was delighted to be at the meeting and is still willing to help with suitable projects.

Mary Ramsay has made a huge contribution to the club and continues to do so. She has organised marshalling rosters for four Bowral Classic cycle races, film nights at the Empire, a couple of trivia nights and two years on the Tulip Time organising committee. She has organised the catering for MUNA students and staff and is doing that again next

month.

Mary told us how she was born a Glaswegian and spent her early years in a tenement. She worked helping SP bookies as a child and spent the money on the pokies at the corner shop instead of banking it! Clearly the beginnings of her interest in the financial world! Her grandfather worked for John Brown, shipbuilders on Clydeside, and enabled her to watch ships being launched. She came to Australia as a 10 pound POM and spent two somewhat depressing years in a hostel before getting established. She has 2 adult children and 5 grandchildren.

Ray Coulton was a member of our club from 2003-2020 and in his working life was a teacher and headmaster. He ran many firewood raffles, ran many BBQs and a couple of trips to Lake Cargelligo after floods had damaged many fences.

Ray then spoke extensively about the many FAME overseas projects that he worked on and this was clearly a highlight of his time in Rotary. He listed a hospital in Port Vila, a regional college in East Timor, constructing pre-fab houses in Tanna (a Vanuatu island), 3 trips to Koripita in Fiji building cottages. A later trip involved building cook houses separate from the cottages after a few fires resulted from cheap kerosene cookers!

Ray urged anyone who hadn't been involved in a FAME (now Rotary Australia World Community Service, RAWCS) trip to enrol in the trip to Vanuatu in August. He displayed a number of photos of the trips that he had been on.

The Raffle was drawn by Mary Ramsay and won by Ian Johnson. The joker is still lying low!

Sergeant Ian mentioned a few events that had occurred on 16 April including the first flight of a woman across the English Channel by Harriet Quimby in 1912. Alan Hoffman snorted or swallowed LSD, national orchid day and, most importantly, it is National Eggs Benedict Day. This was followed by a 'Where Am I' quiz. The answer was **Guyra**, won by **Trevor Fair**
