President Don Graham welcomed our guests: Justine McKinlay (speaker) Bob Miller, former member introduced by Jim Gasson, Joanne Woodman, whose daughter has been an Interactor, introduced by Denise.

Robbie Allen read the International Toast: , **Nelson Rolihlahla Mandela**, byname **Madiba**, was born on 18July, 1918. Recognised as the first Black president of South Africa (1994–99). His lengthy period of incarceration, subsequent release and his negotiations in the early 1990s



with South African Pres.F. W. de Klerk country's apartheid system of racial segregation and ushered in a peaceful transition to majority rule. the Nobel Prize for Peace in 1993 for their efforts.

Mandela established in 1995 the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, which investigated human rights violations under apartheid, and he introduced housing, education, and economic development initiatives designed to improve the living standards of the country's Black population.

In 1996 he oversaw the enactment of a new democratic constitution.

Mandela Day, observed on Mandela's birthday, was created to honour his legacy by promoting community service around the world.

The Rotary Club of Johannesburg is the oldest Club in Johannesburg having been chartered on 1 July 1921 with a current membership of 16 and the President is Gustave Ololo. The Club sponsors a Rotaract Club and an Interact Club. Regrettably, the Club's website has not been updated since 2022.

Of the six Rotary Clubs in Johannesburg only one Club has more than 20 members. The data suggests that Rotary is struggling in that City. This is reflected by the 2022/23 President at the Club's Changeover:

"With reduced financial resources and membership, we will need to consolidate and strengthen our club our club efforts this year through three broad themes:

- A focus on our core projects.
- Greater use of partnerships with other Rotary, Interact, and Rotaract clubs to run joint projects.
- Reminding all Club members of their commitment to paying membership dues, participating in at least one committee or ongoing project, and attending at least 50% of inperson meetings wherever possible."

The Bradman Museum was among several sites featured in the Southern Highlands and the museum asked the club to provide a BBQ. We made a net profit of \$262.00. We had not expected to make a significant amount but felt that it was important to foster good relations with the museum. Dream Cricket,

in particular, comes to mind. They were very helpful and grateful.

Rosemary Kelly introduced Justine McKinlay, our guest speaker. Justine has lived in the area for 16 years, volunteered for work with 'Your Angel' cooking school in 2020 and has now been running it for the past 18 months.



The Your Angel motto is "Bring people together through food"

They were providing food support for those in need during Covid and have now produced 22,000 food kits at a cost of \$5 each

They run cooking classes daytime and evening and also a school holiday program.

They have enabled students from Oxley College to get a cooking qualification and they have shown that the combination of cooking and socialising can be great therapy. Justine gave an example of a person with a brain injury gaining self confidence increasing their participation in the kitchen.

They work in partnership with the Uniting Church and Ozharvest and typically prepare 300 meals on Monday for Ozharvest with about 15 volunteers. This activity also manages to use a lot of food that might otherwise go to landfill.

Justine is keen to get maximum use of the kitchen and has plans to start a class for older men where there is a need for both cooking skills and social contact for improved mental and physical health. President Don asked how they would go about starting a men's group and Justine suggested the Men's Shed in Bowral.

Don then thanked Justine for an interesting and inspiring talk.
