Bowral Uniting Church and Oz Harvest pantry provides help to Southern Highlands families in tough times



Oz Harvest volunteer Frank Kelly and Rev Michael Earl prepare pantry boxes for people in need. A group of volunteers are harvesting goodwill and care for others at a Southern Highlands church.

In fact volunteers from both the Bowral Uniting Church and Oz Harvest have been working together to ensure food reaches the table of many struggling families in the region.

The Uniting Church Pantry was established about 12 months ago to help local families in a time of need.

The charitable service is currently providing food for between 50 and 60 families weekly. Each week volunteers meet on Tuesday and Wednesday at the Uniting Church premises in Bendooley Street, Bowral, to piece together boxes of food and personal items.

The church leader Rev Michael Earl and Oz Harvest volunteer Frank Kelly sung the praises of several Highlands businesses and individuals who helped to ensure the charitable service could continue.

"We have received ongoing donations from several businesses including Aldi Moss Vale, Harris Farm, Woolworths Bowral, Baker's Delight, Capital Chemist," Mr Kelly said.

Rev Earl said the Rotary Club of Bowral-Mittagong had also been an ongoing supporter of the pantry.

"Some businesses such as Capital Chemist donate both money and hygiene products," he said. "We also receive wonderful donations from the community of mostly non-perishable products.

"Several local schools including Bowral Public, Oxley College and the Southern Highlands Christian School are big contributors of non-perishable food."

Neil Mulveney, Champion Press

Mulveney installed the first Harris M110, 5-colour narrow web offset press in the southern hemisphere of Australia. He then installed the second one, in a purpose-built building. Mulveney was instrumental in Champion Press being the first company to use 'scratch and sniff' supplied by 3M and 'scratch and see', and that was 1985. He also built the business by developing inline finishing products. Now in his 90s, Mulveney is known for being open-minded to new innovation and adapting the latest technologies within his business. In more recent times, the company has opted to build its own equipment, instead of depending on expensive American add-on equipment. This has resulted in him driving a successful business and one that is able to make a clear return on investments.
