Le Beccherie is a restaurant in Treviso, 25km north of Venice in Italy. It is famous for the world's best dessert, Tiramisu which was invented there by Chef Roberto Linguanotto and the owner's wife Alba Campeol in 1972.



They were making ice cream when a dollop of mascarpone fell into a bowl of eggs and sugar. Not wishing to waste it they gave it a whip and spread some on some sponge ladyfinger biscuits dipped in coffee. When they dusted it with cocoa it tasted sensational and Tiramisu was born.



Over the weekend the restaurant owner Ado Campeol, who claimed the fame for the dish, passed away aged 93 years old.

This is a small tragedy, a big one for his family. But the good news is that Tiramisu lives on - I (Rod) will even make my annual Tiramisu again this Christmas.

Le Beccherie is a lovely traditional restaurant in a small piazza in the old centre of Treviso which is surrounded by the Venetian walls of its earlier rulers. 3,000 people live within the walls but the metropolitan population is around 86,000.



The city is served by 4 Rotary Clubs, the oldest being the Rotary Club of Treviso Chartered in District 2060 in 1949.

The 68 Members are led by President Andrea Danesin and they have adopted a new Rotary theme, "End Covid Now" to promote vaccination in their town.
