Margie Stuart:

A story about my father Major William Macintosh Gillespie. I am not a historian, however I do have the letters from her father to her mother.

Mac to his mates, Jock to the Aussies. The Gillespie brothers, father and uncle of Mac owned Chattan Iron Works, Bonnybridge outside Edinburgh. The business prospered until the Great Depression, where downturn and embezzlement caused the Works to be sold.



William and spouse Meg moved to Australia, William junior was enrolled at Scots College in the 1920's, where he joined the Cadets. Mac joined CBA and followed is pursuits of sailing, running and horse riding. His experience in the CMF led to him to be commissioned as Lieutenant att he outbreak of WWII.

After outbreaks of the war Mac went to Africa, including Tobruk. Returned to Australia for training in jungle warfare. North Qld was the was the most appropriate location for preparation before being shipped to PNG. Mac's duties were to lead rescue missions where they rescued soldiers and airmen beyond enemy lines. This terrain was a lot different than Africa with mainly swamps and thick jungle.

The most memorable mission was to rescue the crew of a downed B25 bomber in August 1944. It took over 3 weeks to locate the plane which was situated in the middle of a swamp. It was during this exercise that Mac befriended a crew member who was a North American Indian Chief. Even after the war they continued to communicate.

INTERNATIONAL TOAST - MOLDOVA

During the Russian invasion of Ukraine over 4 million people have been displaced. Many of these have gone to the neighbouring countries, mainly Poland, Hungary, Slovakia, Romania and lesser known Moldova.



Moldova is a small landlocked place surrounded by Ukraine on the north and Romania to the south. Its north eastern border is only 60km from Odessa which is under attack.

Moldova is the poorest country in Europe and since it emerged as a principality in the 14th Century it has been owned and occupied by the Ottomans, Russians, Romanians, Germans and the Soviet Union until it gained its independence in 1990.

It suffered forced deportations of native Moldovans under Stalin and since independence it has, like Ukraine and Georgia been subject to part of its territory declaring independence and support for Russia.

Given their history the Moldovans have no liking for Russia and when it attacked Ukraine they immediately applied for membership of the European Union as a security measure.

The Capital is Chisinau, a city of 640 000 in a country of only 2.6 million.

Despite their limited means the Moldovan people have been very welcoming to Ukrainian refugees.



The 20 Members of the Rotary Club of Chisinau Triumph led by President Ion Gabura have been fully engaged in distributing food and clothing and offering help to the refugees. Much of the supplies have come from Rotary in other countries.



This then is their principal project at the moment.

The Club was only Chartered in 2020 and is in District 2241 which covers Romania and the other 7 Clubs in Moldova.
