Internal Toast: Will Eddowes



22 August 1864 saw the adoption of the First Geneva Convention "for the Amelioration of the Condition of the Wounded in Armies in the Field" and was signed by 12 nations. The Geneva Convention of 1906 reviewed and made

improvements to the first Geneva Convention, including protection for wounded or captured prisoners of war and protection for the medical personnel treating, evacuating and removing the dead and wounded.

Events in World War I proved that the amendments made in 1906 were not enough for humanitarian conduct in times of war, which led to the 1929 Geneva Convention to ensure a civilized treatment to the prisoners of war. Although Germany was one of the signatories of the Convention of 1929, it did not stop its fascist government from carrying out horrific acts on both on the civilian and military personnel during World War II. Thus the Geneva Conventions were expanded in 1949 to protect non-combatant civilians.

The Rotary Club of Geneva South was chartered on 8 June 1965 and President Francois Tissot oversees a membership of 85 – interestingly each of the Geneva Clubs has a membership in excess of 60 and each has a robust website.

Key projects include active involvement in the "Rise up Girls" project launched by the Geneva International Club, a project that offers training to young girls from rural areas in Morocco. The Club also conducts the Rotarian Drivers of Classic Vehicles Challenge fundraiser which may interest Robbie Allen as it is next scheduled for 12 July 2024.

2023 trip to Koroipita Village, Lautoka, Fiji

Graham and Robert de Jongh led by Rod Aistrope was away from Sunday 6th to 20th August staying at the Tanoa Waterfront Hotel in Lautoka on the north west corner of Viti Levu, Fiii.

Koroipita Village is a fully serviced suburb with proper roads, drainage, water supply, sewerage and electricity with 263 homes housing over 1100 people who would otherwise be homeless or living in the bush or in squatter settlements. It is a well run, safe place for people to raise their children with rules of residence including all children attending school, no roosters, paying rent and growing their own vegetables. It has a large community hall, factory units for cottage industries, kindergarten, shop and sports courts like any other town.

It was developed on leased land by our friend Peter Drysdale and the Rotary Club of Lautoka over the past 15 years with financial support from NZ Aid and great support, financial and physical from Rotary Clubs in Australia and New Zealand and other volunteers. This was our Club's fifth visit having built and maintained houses and other things and donated computers and other things in 2010, 2011, 2013 and 2018.

A fourth stage, K4 with another 105 homes is under construction and the first 20 of these was opened by the Minister for Housing, Mr Maciu Nalumisa last week.

At our meeting on Tuesday evening Rod and the Team, except for Robert who they gave to Fiji to keep (but is actually scuba diving on an outer island with Mara this week), described the project and the work that they did over 10½ days on site.

They had expected to be building one of the new houses but none were available so their first task was to partially demolish and repair a house damaged by a fire in its cook house. That took the first week with a new cook house with a new concrete floor built, damaged walls and roof structure replaced and re-roofed and painted out internally.

In the second week they poured a slab for a waiting area shelter for the medical centre, refitted doors to two of the factory units with parliament hinges to open outwards and demolished a garden structure and rebuilt a quality green house for use by the new residents of the new K4 houses.

The workers of Koroipita who built the new houses were enthusiastic supporters of the Team and did the roof work, banged a lot of nails and mixed concrete for the floors.

Out of work time the Team was constantly entertained by Robert drawing on his vast reservoir of dad and other jokes and really enjoyed each other's company, ate a variety of cuisines, took a cruise out to an island on the Sunday and a visit to a zip line park out of Lautoka and attended a small meeting of the RC Lautoka at the famous Northern Club which was the daily watering hole for rehydration purposes.
