Ian Langford, reporting on our 14th annual Southern Highlands Challenge, gave thanks to everyone who had contributed, - Rotarians, their partners, Uniting Church members, Engineers from Engineers Australia and their partners, and the generous financial contributions of our sponsors.

He related how difficult it had been, 14 years ago, to raise enthusiasm amongst our schools, and to goad the busy teachers into responding in a timely fashion to the legal and procedural requirements needed to run such an event. Today the event is run at maximum capacity with limits placed on the number of participating schools and pupils.

Ian gave special thanks to **Rod Aistrope** for his remarkable fund-raising success, raising more than the \$19,000 needed to stage this event. To the schools involved, there is no cost, - not even the children's lunches. Also, special thanks the Mittagong RSL for hosting our events at no cost.

Rod Aistrope responded that since its inception here in the Highlands 14 years ago, Ian has been the driving force behind the event. Early each year he assembles a small committee of Club members and local Engineers to work through to the event in late May. Rod is lobbying for interested new members to join.

Rod further announced that with some surplus funds this year, he will place a paid advertisement about the Challenge in the Highlands News recognising all our sponsors.

Meeting discussion led by Dominic Williams on the proposed Indigenous Voice to Parliament.

Main Speaker and discussion moderator: Dominic Williams QC, Rotarian



Dominic was introduced briefly by **Lynton Kettle** as a Barrister, a Farmer, a pilot, and a long-serving Rotarian. He transferred to our club in 2020. By way of stating his credentials to lead the meeting, Dominic explained that he had for 15 years been a board member and chairman of an Indigenous Community Development Fund, having in that time consulted with the Baniyala Aboriginal Community in Arnhem Land. He planned to speak briefly on the Voice and then open the floor for discussion.

Dominic outlined the steps taken by the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island people since, -through the referendum of 1967, - they were included in the Australian Parliamentary vote. Out of the Uluru Statement of the Heart in 20xx came the wish for an entrenched body in

What work has been done so far.

Parliament to advise on Aboriginal affairs. This would be called the Voice.

Particularly the Voice would work towards "closing the gap" between aboriginal and other Australians in demographics including,

Life expectancy, health, prison numbers, etc.

The current government now plans to hold a referendum later this year in which Australians will vote on inclusion of the Voice in the Constitution.

Currently the Polls indicate that around 63% are in favour of inclusion.

Arguments against inclusion currently include,

Every Australian should be treated equally. The Voice will become divisive.

Not enough detail in the definition of the Voice. Aboriginals are themselves have divided opinions, Why is it necessary to include in the Constitution? Why not legislate first, - include after testing.

These and other questions will be raised and discussed in the coming months prior to the election. Dominic, with all his experience, argues convincingly that the Voice came out of the greatest meeting of Aboriginal people at Uluru, and that it is all about lifting all Australians to the same level.

Several members spoke from the floor.

Ian Donges thanked Dom for his clear and thoughtprovoking words, and the meeting showed its appreciation in the customary way.

The Voice was proposed in the Uluru Statement from the Heart.

It was presented to the nation five years ago on 26 May 2017 by delegates to the First Nations National Constitutional Convention, held over four days near Uluru in Central Australia.

The 250-member convention was held after the 16-member Referendum Council had travelled around the country and met with over 1,200 people.

The Uluru Statement from the Heart calls for, "... the establishment of a First Nations Voice enshrined in the Constitution and a Makarrata Commission to supervise a process of agreement-making and truth-telling about our history."

In the five years since the release of the Uluru Statement from the Heart, a Joint Select Committee has considered the proposal.

An Indigenous Voice Co-design process outlined, in detail, options for how a Voice could work.

Further work will continue in partnership with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people about what will go forward and ultimately **the Australian people will be asked to support an Indigenous Voice to Parliament being enshrined in our Constitution**.
