Announcements – Polio Day



David, as part of International Polio Day, showed a video and provided an update on the worldwide progress to eradicate Polio.

When polio is eradicated it will be only the second time in memory that a disease has been eradicated.

Stay committed, or become committed in the eradication of Polio. Let's drop to zero. There were 350,000 cases in 1988, 37 cases in 2016 and only 12 so far in 2017.

Zambia is celebrating its independence from Great Britain when on this day in 1964 it became a Republic.

It had been colonised during the latter part of the 19th Century after Dr Livingston got lost walking through and Cecil Rhodes' geologist found copper. It was named Northern Rhodesia after him in 1911.

For most of its colonial period it was governed by a London appointed administration with advice from the British South Africa Company part owned and directed by Rhodes himself.

Kenneth Kaunda was the first President of the one party state which has evolved peacefully to now be a stable multi party democracy with a population of 16.6 million.

The country still relies on copper for over 60% of its export income.

The Capital is Lusaka, a city of 1.8 million with 7 of Zambia's 22 Rotary Clubs.

The Rotary Club of Maluba was chartered in 1983 in District 9210 which also covers Malawi, Zimbabwe and part of Mozambique.

It has 62 Members led by President Aditya Devalia who have just had a Grand Premiere Film fund raiser and are in the middle of running a screening kiosk at a major shopping centre in Lusaka as part of Breast Cancer Awareness Month.

Guest Speaker - Chris Neale



Nepal Chamkharta Village Rainwater and Education Project

Introduction by Ken Adams - Chris was member of the RC of Goulburn, Bowral-Mittagong and currently Bomaderry.

Prior to the earthquake contacted Nepal seeking projects. First project was a water management system co-jointly with RC of Dhulikhel.

Sponsorship \$13k made up of Shoalhaven clubs and a District Grant. Project is just east of Kathmandu. Encouraged RC Dhulikhel to select the project.

After the earthquake the project commenced, as well as water management, included toilet construction, computer labs.

Water management includes water ponds built on the side of the mountains to catch and retain water.

Stage 3, Nepal Project - Global grant application through RC of Dhulikhel. Planning to develop a goat herd, 180 nannies and 5 bucks, as well as housing etc.

The next year an avalanche closed Mt Everest, and as each climber's costs are \$100k the loss of income was tremendous.
