However, Rotary’s success is not measured by numbers or achievements alone—it is measured by the people behind every act of service, by each of you.

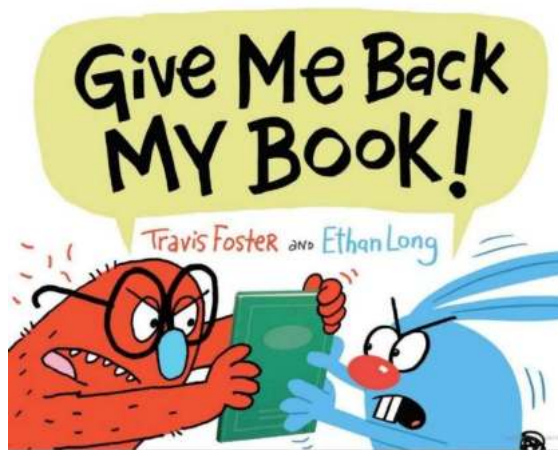

Guest Speaker Roma Dix was introduced by Will Eddowes. Roma used to teach Music at Frensham (now retired) and was widely involved in this area for decades for inspiring students and adults with music. She is one of the founders of the Southern Highlands Symphony Orchestra. Since 1986 she has been running the Braille Music Camp,



Summary of Roma's heartwarming talk:

Louis Braille invented the reading and writing system used by visually impaired people which was named after him. Photo of Braille attached.

She briefly explained Braille which consists of 6 dots giving 64 combinations of letters. Braille books were handed out to members to view. Every blind person learns literary braille.

Blind music students are known to have perfect pitch, Every child learns the piano.

The student choir sing together 3 times a day.

Two blind teachers from Melbourne go to Frensham each year for camp which is held in July. Students come from all over Australia. The Camp organisers aim is to keep fees as low as possible. Roma explained how camp works and in the week they stay at the Camp they are taught independent life skills. Past students are now helping to run the camps.

Roma handed around an instrument which shows how braille works. Computers are used today.

Cost of these camps is high to run as there are airfares and boarding fees.

Future fundraising activity is a concert at St Jude's church on Saturday 1st March.

Staff involved in concert and camp are all volunteers.

On 4th July campers put on a wonderful concert. Rosemay Kelly talked about her experience at one of these.

Roma also handed out a book for members to view called "Read, Sing and Play"

Tony Glenn was then invited to thank Roma for her compassion, passion and energy.


