Last Sunday was **World Polio Day** which celebrated the success of the global project to eliminate polio and highlighted its continued persistence in Nigeria, Afghanistan and Pakistan.

The coordinated fight against polio had its roots in an article in Readers Digest in April, 1979 describing how the World Health Organisation had eradicated smallpox from the planet for \$100 million. It was read by then **President of Rotary International Clem Renouf** and was his inspiration in looking to involve Rotary in a significant disease eradication project.

He rang Dr Anthony Fauci's predecessor at the American National Institutes of Health, Dr John Sever who happened to be one of his District Governors. The President asked what disease could be eliminated with the greatest benefit to mankind which Rotary could be capable of achieving.

The answer of course was polio and at an RI Board meeting later in the year then Past President Clem Renouf had the following motion adopted:

That the eradication of polio and alleviation of its consequences will be the primary focus of Rotary's Health, Hunger and Humanity goals.



42 years on it still is and the job is nearly done.

The immunisation of children in the Philippines in 1979 was the first step and in 1985 Polio Plus began. Good news today was the agreement of the Taliban government to allow mass vaccination of all of the children of Afghanistan. Hopefully that will reduce the outstanding countries to 2 before too long.


Clem Renouf's vision will see polio go the same way as smallpox did and the children of the world will grow up with one less threat to happy active lives.

He was born in 1920 and died last year. He received many awards including Membership of the Order of Australia.

He was a Member of the **Rotary Club of Nambour** in District 9620 in Queensland from 1950 until his death.

The Club was Chartered in 1949 and has 18 Members who are still very proud of his long Membership among them. Their **President is Edward Ong.**

Several of our Club members had joined him on the project for various periods including Will, Ian Langford, Rod, Lynton, Robert, and Carolina. Carolina joined Don's presentation give us her own impressions and experiences of her 8 days working on the fences and enjoying the after-work camaraderie of the camp.

After a brief introduction to what "home" looked like at the camp, both the "luxury" of his caravan which he enjoyed with wife Chris and Sally the dog, and the "Pod", portable standard single accommodation for volunteers.

Rod gave us a brief history of BlazeAid, born out of the 2009 Black Saturday bushfires in Victoria. Started by a farming couple who had to enlist neighbours to quickly re-build their own fire-destroyed fences, BlazeAid has grown into an Australia-wide, non-Government organisation, funded volunteer communities to recover from devastating bushfires in all States. It plans to close by Christmas, with Cabargo being the last camp. Don encouraged those who could, to find a week, -the minimum time to spend, - or more at the camp before it closes. Carolina added that the pods, although small, had their own heating lighting, and were warm and comfortable. One brings one's own sheets and other "luxuries"!

Don described the typical day with the morning muster in the portable hall, referred to as the White Elephant, to moving out in teams to erect fences where farmers had been required to remove burnt fences and clear the lines ready for fencing. Bright clothing, radio and safety equipment, and other equipment was provided.
