On 26 September1580 Sir Francis Drake completed his three-year circumnavigation of the world, sailing into the port of Plymouth aboard the 'Golden Hind'. Although primarily known as an explorer and naval tactician, Drake also served as the Mayor of Plymouth and as a Member of Parliament. His impact extended beyond exploration and politics to the realm of naval warfare, where he helped revolutionize naval combat during the Elizabethan era.

Asha Aylett's contribution to Shelterbag



Asha came forward to present to Rotary his takings from three days of busking around Bowral with his violin.

The \$267 he raised was donated towards the Shelterbag project.

Asher thanked Mary Crammond for her assistance in raising the funds by demonstrating Shelterbags The funds raised represent the purchase of three shelterbags. A great effort!

Following diner, Denise introduced our speaker, Mary Crammond.

"We have got to know Mary over the past few months so no introduction is really needed. Mary is here to talk about her passionate project, - Shelterbags. She is the Past President of Terrigal Rotary Club, 2017/18 and 2018/19 and a Paul Harris Fellow".

Mary Crammond - "Shelterbags for the Homeless".





Mary gave us an inspiring talk on how Shelterbags for the homeless in Australia grew out of a Rotary sister-club visit Mary made to Cape Town, where she witnessed a Rotary project manufacturing and distributing comfortable, waterproof, wearable (when rolled up) sleeping bags especially designed to offer protection, warmth, and dignity to the homeless. She explained how the original design had come from Holland, developed back in 2014 by a young Dutch designer Bas Timmer whose homeless father had died of hyperthermia. Later, visiting Cape Town he saw a need for a lighter weight bag for warmer climates, and by training unemployed and relatively inexpensive labour, commenced production.

On returning to Australia, Mary investigated the state of homelessness, and finding it far more prevalent than she had realised, decided through her club, the Terrigal Rotary Club, to import and test the sleeper bag for Australian conditions.

Mary commented that within Rotary, she found it easy to start the project. In that early COVID period, seeing in Gosford a growing number of homeless on the streets, she registered the project with RAWCS. Then through her club, imported more. TV, Radio and RDU interviews followed in 2020, as did demand, and at the year end with \$230,000 she ordered a container full of 2,900 bags. Distribution has been through the various outreach organisations caring for the homeless, and it has been Country-wide. The cost of each bag is between \$78 and \$90.

Now the aim of Mary's project is to provide a Shelterbag to every person in Australia who needs one.

Questioned on the possibility of local manufacture, Mary said that had been investigated, however the cost of material and labour cost in Australia made local manufacture prohibitive. There was also discussion about homeless people sleeping on the streets of Bowral and the help being provided by local organisations, particularly the Uniting Church.

Bob Miller gave the vote of thanks.
