The meeting was held in the Cafeteria at Bowral High School from 4pm to 6pm. Outgoing President Lauren Healy handed over the reins to Meg Pavior. **Sergeant Lynton Kettle** called the meeting to order and welcomed guests Anna Crawford, Kate Fair, Rosemary Eddowes and Bob Miller.

#### **International Toast: Ian Donges**

Today, 29 August 2023, is International Day Against Nuclear Tests.

North Korea conducted 6 explosive nuclear tests between 2006 and 2017. The 2017 test released approximately 140 kilotons of energy, approximately 7-10 times more than the bombs dropped in Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

The threat is ongoing, particularly for its immediate neighbour.

Rotary has a strong position across the border in South Korea. Notably, the Rotary Club of Seoul which was the first Club chartered in South Korea on 10 November 1927, with a current membership of 56, led by President Jhinu Jung.

- Best Club award for Community Service Project leading the global grant project for donating infant incubators to the Tondo medical center in the Philippines.

The Club also sponsors and supports the Seoul Young Leaders Club (SYLC) which in reality is

a Rotaract Club. That Club in June this year held a baseball game as a successful fundraiser. The name of PDG. B.R. Sohn popped up again as a major donor to the event. We need one of those guys!

### Announcements:

**President Don** asked for help in delivering a trailer load of firewood to David Rees who is recovering very well from his recent heart operation. Robert de Jongh volunteered to assist.

**Tony Glenn** needs the club to volunteer seriously to help with the Dream Cricket Gala Day on Friday 27<sup>th</sup> of October. We need about 30 members, partners and friends on the day. It is easy work and is probably the most rewarding work we do in the Club when you see the pleasure and wonder on the children's faces. A roster form was circulated.

**Tony Glenn** also called for more volunteers to help with the Bowral Classic Barbecue. Even if you can't help on the stall, help is also needed for the set up and pull down.

**Mary Ramsay** announced that the Bowral Classic marshalling roster is now complete and emphasised that she would like it to stay that way.

**Rosemary Kelly** has now agreed a date with Annesley Retirement Village for a tour. We need at least 15 people to attend on the 15<sup>th</sup> of November at 10am for a two hour tour and presentation. If we achieve that, Annesley has offered to donate \$500 to the Club. **Rosemary Kelly** is also working with others to organise a Club Car Rally, probably mid-March next year. She is considering the benefits of having it mid-week rather than a more expensive weekend.

# Guest Speaker – Anna Crawford.

**Rosemary Kelly** introduced Anna as the Club's selected local health worker for a Vocational Award as the 2023 Nurse of the Year.



Anna is a clinical midwife specialist working at Bowral & District Hospital, and in early 2022 she commenced a quality improvement project called The BBACC Pack (Bowral Babies and Complex Care), which focussed on the care of newborns who require resuscitation and stabilisation in a regional hospital.

In December 2021, a woman with a history of two previous caesareans had been free birthing at home. She had been told by two hospitals that it was unsafe to attempt a vaginal birth given she had had two previous caesareans in Lithuania using a classical incision. The vertical cut meant she was at high risk of her uterus rupturing during labour, which was potentially fatal for her, the baby, or both. She was told she would need an elective caesarean. The woman didn't want this. She ceased antenatal care, and decided to labour at home without a clinician present. She arrived to Bowral maternity at 8.15 on a Saturday night, screaming, fully dilated, with a ruptured uterus, and a severely compromised baby born minutes later with no heart rate. Two weeks later in the same birthing room, a baby was born at 24 weeks gestation while her mother was waiting for a transfer to a tertiary hospital. The baby girl was born at 6.50 in the morning, 16 weeks early, and weighing 600g. In both cases, Anna was part of the team receiving the baby. Some midwives will experience an extreme case like this once in their careers. Anna experienced both, up close, a fortnight apart. As a team, they did a lot of things right, but they could have done better. These two experiences inspired Anna to focus on improving the complex neonatal care provided by midwives in our regional setting.

Anna set about sending out surveys, reviewing relevant cases and consumer feedback, and sought clinician and managerial input. She decided to create a clinical support pack of information dedicated to this area, covering clinical skills, procedures and equipment use, and individualised to the Bowral facility. She wanted this pack to be easily accessible online, on any computer or mobile phone, both at work and at home. She also wanted to create a physical pack of information that was comprehensive but compact.

After considering several delivery options, she chose to use Microsoft SharePoint, where she could create an online hub accessible through Microsoft Office. She designed a home page and uploaded the completed topics. She also included quick links to commonly used resources, an emergency contact list and a document library.



SharePoint is also user-friendly for mobiles. After downloading the App, clinicians can navigate to the hub in less than 10 seconds, and access a specific guide in less than 30 seconds. To create a physical pack, visual guides and resources were laminated and stored in BBACC Pack Folders.

Neonatal antibiotics was a specific area in which midwives lacked confidence, so Anna put together an Antibiotics Kit, containing both visual and text only guides, ready-made supply packs, and all necessary documents. As of now, the BBACC Pack Hub is about 75% complete – with remaining resources to be added in 2023.

The second area Anna wanted to address was improving the care provided to mothers to establish breastfeeding when their baby is unwell or pre-term. She designed a brochure specifically for these women with written and visual instructions, a QR code to a video demonstration, feeding plans and useful tips. She packed the brochure into a pathology bag along with all the supplies a new mother would need for the first 24 hours.



While still a work in progress, feedback for the BBACC Pack Hub has been positive, in terms of depth of topics, supplementary materials and accessibility. The EBM Kits (Expressed Breastmilk) and ISOC Kits (Immuno-Supportive Oral Care) have also been wellreceived, acting as a prompt for clinicians, empowering mothers with consistent information, and helping to implement ISOC as standard practice.

The project that Anna has developed and introduced impressed all at the meeting and after many questions it was time to present Anna with her award. PP Rosemary Kelly and President Don Graham presented Anna with a framed certificate of appreciation as the Nurse of the Year, a bouquet of flowers and a pen. The Club also made a \$500 donation to Australian Rotary Health in Anna's name. Anna Crawford was certainly a worthy recipient of the award and we thanked her for her work and her presentation to the Club.

**Ian Donges – Quiz.** Ian then held one of his "Who Am I?" quizzes. The answer was David Koch. The winner was Mary Ramsey.

**Ian Law** told the Club about a Bush Dance being organised by the Southern Highlands Older Women's Network to raise funds which will be used to help prevent women's homelessness in the Southern Highlands. 


# PP Leigh Robinson
