Ian Donges - Quiz

Ian ran one of his popular quizzes – "Who am I"? The answer wasDame Marie Bashir, identified by several very early in the list of questions.

Guest Speaker: Ian Mander, - Brain Tumour Survivor.

Our guest speaker was introduced by Ian Johnson.

Ian Mander thanked the club for the invitation to speak about his experiences with Blood Cancer, starting with a brief background to his life prior of 2015 when following an ultrasound scan on a pain in his side, it was discovered that he had a lymphoma.

lan's father was a £ 10 Pom, and his Mother Australian. Born and schooled in Geelong he worked as a jackaroo, then went backpacking in Europe where he met his Welsh-Australian wife in Hampshire, UK. Later, returning to Australia, they settled in Sydney when his wife was offered work there with her former employer. Ian decided to enter the finance business. While working at Goldman Sachs in 2015 the pain in his side developed which led to the cancer lymphoma diagnosis.

Initial treatment involved Chemo at the San for six months, after which he returned to work. Ian realised that there was more to life than the stress of long hours and high work pressure at Goldman Sachs. HE resolved to find a more relaxed life. However, further tests indicated further treatment and Ian left his \$9,000 a month job for \$40 support from the Government while he underwent more treatment.

lan then recounted the long process of treatments, hopes and disappointments, - but with some good fortune, - as he underwent multiple treatments in the public hospital system. A bone-marrow transplant to correct his failing auto-immune system was prescribed. By good fortune a good 11/12 match was soon found on the world registries. The donor lived in Britain. An Australian nurse was flown there to take part in the extraction process and to bring the bone-marrow back. The chance of such a good match is very low, - lan was lucky. It was late February 2020, and the whole process had taken about six weeks. The transplant was effective until late in 2023 Ian had a neurological disorder and he was rushed back into North Shore hospital where it was found that he had a cancer in his brain that had been there from the start. In a difficult procedure that involved treating the cancer with Chemo but avoiding the body, the cancer was eliminated.

The reason Ian was telling his story was to spread awareness of the Australian Stem Cell (Bone Marrow) Registry that relies on donors in a similar manner to the Blood Bank. There is an age group limit for donors and a preference for male donors. (See note below). It has been forecast that worldwide, 20% of the registered donors will no longer be eligible to donate next year. Registration is by blood sample and can be done at the same time as Blood Bank donation.

Ian recognised that he was addressing a Club of mostly Seniors but hoped that his message might be passed on to the next generation. Lives could be saved!

In question time following his address, Ian had high praise for the public health system which also covered the full cost of his treatment. He emphasised that he had been very lucky, - some patients never find a match.

Ian currently undergoes tests six weekly.

Donator credentials:

Age: Potential donors are listed on the registry until their 61st birthday. However, doctors request donors in the 18 to 44 age group nearly 75 percent of the time. Research shows that younger donors provide the greatest chance for transplant success.

A vote of thanks was given by Bruce Sutton and the Club who joined in wishing Ian everything of the best for the future.
