

Fiji update – by president Lynton

All remaining members of the Bowral Mittagong RAWCS team still working well despite heat, humidity, dehydration and bendy nails. Manage to address first three issues at knockoff but nails not yet manufactured that can be driven in straight on this project.

The team has just had a tasty Indian meal of dhal, rice, salad and tamarind paste prepared by the family of a village resident. There was initially some reluctance as the whole host family that fed and entertained us on Friday night with a wonderful 15 dish Indian meal have come down with a stomach bug and the breadwinner didn't turn up for work yesterday.

We got out of Lautoka on the weekend and did some bush walking, sightseeing, shopping and eating at Nadi and south coast around to Sigatoka.The bushwalking put Rods new knees to the test. Learnt a lot about the geography and culture of both the indigenous Fijians and Fijian Indian populations.

The accommodation at The Cathay Hotel has received mixed reviews from the team members. The way they normally travel has coloured their perception of the standard of shelter provided by this establishment. Complaints are filled out in quadruplicate, as are the breakfast menus. The staff can anticipate the nature of the complaint by the room number of the guest as the reception desk is approached. Moving from one room to another just exchanges one fault for another. However, all complaints met with a smile and one day the cyclone damage may be repaired.

However, location can be everything, with the Northern Club, a relic of colonial history, is right across the road. This has an excellent swimming pool, squash courts, tennis courts and gym. We intend, one day, to get past the rehydration area and inspect these facilities.

Rod, an over engineering specialist, is supervising the preparation of the floor slab for an experimental cottage industry light industrial complex for the village. Rod, unusually, feels that there is too much steel in the design. He has rejected the obvious solution, which is to pull out the steel reinforcement after local government inspection, on flimsy, leftist moral grounds. Rod, in his spare time has creditably built two tables for the preschool centre. Rob Uhl is now painting them.

Mary, after a courageous battle with Hotel management involving three changes of room, eventually resulting in a move to a Qantas seat, achieved a great deal refreshing the current common and commercial centre of the original village. Mary has given the area around the preschool, local shop, office and computer room a full makeover, brightening the whole area. It was not an easy job.

Rob has tackled everything she attempts with a great deal of gusto and enthusiasm. Any shutter below 5 foot that requires repainting has been covered in yellow paint. The village paint scheme of blue and yellow mirrors the Rotary corporate colours. This has resulted in a great deal of interaction with the local residents, and conversation for later.

The later arrivals, Jacinta and Slavica, first day, poured and finished the concrete paving under the new solar water condensation plants. Since then, nailing strapping, carrying timber, digging pier holes and stripping formwork provided a good introduction to them entertaining/teaching a preschool class of village children this morning. The children won, and both are back working on erecting the cookhouses with Don.

Don has been building cookhouses. His friendly disposition, most unlawyer like, has usually resulted in a crowd of residents, mainly children, standing around waiting to hand him a nail. They applaud when he gets one in straight. His friendship with his local assistant Arvin, resulted in an invitation to Arvin's residence. We had a magnificent Indian banquet and cultural experience that night.

Vicki has been working hard as assistant to master fitter Will, known locally as "Mr Millimeter", but known to the team as "drop off". Will and Vicki have been making security doors and grills with Will achieving mechanical engineering tolerances using bent and bowed timber as his raw material. Vicki is incredibly energetic and dynamic managing the security screen team of Will and Davida and other itinerant helpers. The residents are very appreciative of the finished doors and screens.

There are numerous other minor works being done by the team as well, with maintenance and construction issues addressed as they are drawn to our attention. Everyone is working hard in conditions we are not used to, and gradually adjusting to Fijian time and attitudes, however, plenty of laughter and unplanned entertainment as with all Rotary projects.
