



International Toast – Rosemary Kelly

The Commonwealth of Dominica is one of the Lesser Antilles islands in the Caribbean just off the coast of South America.

It was the first island discovered by Christopher Columbus on his second voyage on 3rd November, 1493 which was a Sunday so he named it in Latin dies Dominica which, as we all know means Sunday.

France had influence over Dominica until 1763 when it lost the territory to Britain after the Seven Years War.

It gained its Independence from the UK on 3rd November, 1978 and remains a Member of the Commonwealth of Nations.

The Country has a population of 73 000 and its main foreign earnings come from tourism and dodgy financial services - it is a tax shelter. Economic citizenship can be purchased for \$US105,000 per person or the family rate of \$US130,000.

In October, 2017 severe Hurricane Maria laid waste to much of the country and the Rotary Club of Portsmouth has been involved in rebuilding school facilities and services ever since. They recently joined with the Rotary Club of Barbados to replace computers in a local school computer centre.

The Club serves the second largest town, Portsmouth with a population of 3,000 located on the

north cost of Dominica. It is one of 2 Clubs in Dominica which is in District 7030 which covers 14 countries in the Caribbean and South America.

It was Chartered in 2013 and has 21 Members led by President Sari Prosper.

WHERE DOES THIS EDUCATION CENTRE FIT

A core aim of a botanic garden is to provide education to the public Our vision is "to be the leader in displaying and researching both the exotic and native flora of the Southern Highlands, advancing the knowledge of horticulture, conservation and sustainability to the wider community".

to the wider community;
In working towards this vision,
our present adult education
program will be expanded to include
information sessions on endangered
and threatmed species, some of
which will be planted in our native
garden. Demonstrations will be held
for the public on endangered flora,
propagating their seeds, growing
their seeds and using low water principles
in their garden.

WHAT ARE THE FACILITIES IN THE EDUCATION CENTRE?

The building wile constructed of colorobond cladding, in keeping with the style of the current utility buildings, it will be located next to the Shed and will have big bried doors opening to the north with a verandah on three sides. A small kitchenette will be at the rear. Solar panels are in Keeping will not be promitted to the shed and the shed will be at the rear.

The building will accommodate up to 50 individuals and the most up-to-date audio-visual equipment will form part of the fit-out, together with air conditioning.
