Berlin Wall



Potsdamer Platz, November 1989

As is well known, after the Second World War Germany and Berlin were divided into 4 administration zones between Britain, France, the USA and the USSR. Free movement between these sectors was allowed but after mass emigration of people from the Russian zone into the western zones the border was closed leaving Berlin isolated within what would become East Germany.

The city remained as the only easy way out and after continued mass movement of people from the USSR Sector brought the total of escapees from the coming harsh regime to over three and a half million the Russians decided to build The **Berlin Wall**surrounding the western sectors.

Construction of 155km of wall with a wide cleared death strip of guns, pits, razor wire, mines and patrols began on 13th August, 1961. It symbolised what Churchill called the "Iron Curtain" across Europe.

During its 28 years over 5 000 people attempted escape - about 200 of them died trying.

In 1989 revolution in Poland and Hungary led to uprising in East Germany and in November free access through the wall was allowed. Its demolition began in 1990 and Germany was reunited that year.

Yesterday marked the day that the Berlin Wall has been down longer than it was up. It serves as a reminder that the determination of people to be free will always triumph in the end.

The Rotary Club of Berlin-Potsdamer Platz is based on the major town square close to the centre of the city which was split by the Wall at its south west corner.

It was Chartered in 2007 and is one of 19 Clubs in Berlin and 87 in District 1940.

President Martin Mohns leads 45 Members. Their recent projects include a playground for a children's hospice and a vocational information day conducted with another Club.

In celebration of the fading memory of the Berlin Wall and those who lost their lives trying to cross it, would you please be upstanding and toast the President and Members of the Rotary Club of Berlin-Potsdamer Platz.

Josie spoke in Feb 2017, had 10 iPods, now have 31 with a lot of music, have added music to personal playlist. Listeners get great enjoyment from them.

Vanuatu Sewing project....Trish and Bob Rheinberger went to Vanuatu, looking for project, visited Bishop, helped out in Santo, made benches for a church, deconstructed, titivated, cleared drains, Bob worked with cattle. Saw an opportunity to make clothes. Principal asked them to make school uniforms.

100 girls, 2 uniforms for each, became a big chore. Many people have helped including Mara who has been to 'sewing sweat shops' at Trish's house. Group has made 500 uniforms. Polo shirts have been purchased for about \$2.50 each and will be donated to boys at the schools for uniforms. Last year Trish saw that local women in Vanuatu were keen to learn. She took machines and fabric. Lincraft really helped with giving 50% discounts. 4 day Workshops, thus need for more machines. Robert de J was interested in Trish's project and made a presentation and took it to RCBM. Individual member donations as well as some club funds have enabled Rotary to purchase 9 sewing machines and 1 overlocker for Trish to take to Vanuatu. Gerry Kroon negotiated discounted price for Janome machines with Theresa from Nowra Sewing Essentials.
