#### ROTARY CLUB OF BOWRAL MITTAGONG TULIP TIMES BULLETIN for 6th MAY, 2025

**Sergeant Lynton Kettle** opened the meeting and welcomed visitors **Paul and Suzanne Cooke**, guests of Graham Castle, and **Shelley Boyce** (Angels in our Town).

He also welcomed **Robbie Allen** as our speaker for the night.

Sergeant Lynton proceeded to deliver the Invocation and the International Toast:

The **Rotary Club of Powell River** was founded in June 1955 and is therefore celebrating 70 years of service. They meet at Julie's Airport Café and the current president is Kelly Kiel.

They have a number of projects, one being the clipping the adipose fins of Coho Salmon. The Salmon Society is undertaking its largest clipping campaign with a goal of clipping 300,000 fish. The Adipose Fin is between the Dorsal and Caudal fins and removal aids fish identification



Why is this significant? Our preliminary guest speaker, Shelley Boyce, was sponsored by the Powell River Rotary Club as an International Exchange student in 1975. As an exchange student she met and later married Philip Boyce.

Shelley is here to promote 'Angels in our Town'. She has been involved with Interact, Rotaract and Rotary for 28 years including three times as president of Berrima District Rotary club.

The club has been asked for assistance by Gerringong Rotary Club with raising funds for an ultra sound machine at a medical clinic in Africa. To be discussed by the Board.




Leigh Robinson and Steve Escott are investigating best value for money for a first aid course for the club.

As stated by President Bob, she has been involved in every role in Rotary except District Governor but her current passion is for the Angels. These are the first responders and volunteers upon who we depend. They are tireless with little thanks. The annual parade is very much appreciated but it is expensive, around \$80,000. This has to cover a DA and, in particular, entertainers and equipment for the evening. Shelley promoted their Winter Ball to raise money for the parade. **President Bob** reported on a Tulip Time meeting with Rachael and Suzanne of Destination Southern Highlands. Still no decision on whether 'after dark' events will be planned but looking unlikely. The event covers 25 days.

**Robbie Allen** was our speaker for the evening talking about her recent adventures in South Africa. She was introduced by **Trevor Fair**. Her notes below:





We were travelling light with only a small carry on for the overhead locker. We had purchased some Duty Free alcohol which the fellow at the store said we must put in our checked luggage.

So our small carry- ons now contained gin and whisky, and were duly checked through to Port Elizabeth.

Another easy flight on South African Airlines saw us waiting at the carousel for our bags. Many bags came and went, people still waiting and suddenly carousel stopped dead and no more bags appeared. No announcements were made.

I noticed people lining up at a counter further over who appeared to be asking about their luggage.

Finally at the head of the queue were told our baggage would be on the next plane coming in from Johannesburg which should arrive in about 1 hour. OK so we decided to stay even though our friends were waiting to take us to a pleasant resort about 2 hours away. We all caught up and went for coffee and cake a little way away and lots of chat.

Time to return to airport for our bags and then we would be on our way.

The lady told us unfortunately the plane had been delayed leaving Johannesburg and would not arrive till 5.30pm. We asked if they could be delivered to our resort either this evening or tomorrow morning. Not a problem, address duly given for the delivery driver and we were on our way again. The Resort, a collection of delightful cottages overlooking the Addo Elephant Park.

Fired up the braai and had some lovely lamb.

Early to bed, had been a long day.

Next morning, no sign of the baggage. So shower and same clothes on again.

There was some excuse why they had not been delivered, but they were safe in the airline office. We decided to pick them up on our return trip through PE in 2 days time.



That morning we went through to Addo Elephant Sanctuary where after 2 hours traveling through the park we saw 1 big elephant. Decided to leave the park for a picnic lunch and then return in the afternoon.

Coming back through the entrance the Ranger told us where all the elephants had been sighted, so off we go. A nice big flat plain with hundreds of elephants, big ones small ones and lots of babies being protected by Mum. What a sight. Amazing!

Went to a lovely hotel for dinner, the most amazing oysters, huge and delicious.

Next morning headed back to Port Elizabeth airport to collect baggage. Sure enough there were our lonely carry on bags waiting. Any chance of compensation. Non was offered.

The reason the bags had been offloaded was there was going to be a Iron Man race in PE that weekend and their bicycles etc had priority over ours and other passengers bags.

We head off to Plettenburg Bay where our friends lived on a Farm. Quite delightful. Fresh clothes after four days what a treat. That evening a busy restaurant overlooking the bay. I think mussels and seafood was enjoyed once more. Gin and whisky was now on the agenda.

We then headed in to the Karoo, a semi-arid region of SA also known as the "Land of Thirst" characterized by its landscape and diverse vegetation, succulents and low scrub. One of the largest desert regions in the world, spanning over 500,000 Sq Kilometers'. We stayed at Prince Albert, a lovely tiny town which attracts many tourists and artists as it has amazing clear skies and golden light. Hence many Art Galleries in the main street. We dined at "The Rude Chef" that evening and another delicious meal was had.

After a few more relaxing days we headed for George airport to return to Johannesburg to stay with more friends. We had a text from Margie saying they had no water. Oh dear!

Picked up by Margie and partner and driven to their home in the suburb of Randburg. A fairly up market suburb. Beautiful home on a large block with pool and tennis courts but no water. It had just been turned off. And no indication when it would be turned on again. There were large containers of drinking water and huge buckets of water to fill the cistern in the toilets. We were lucky there was electricity as apparently 2 weeks earlier there was none.

Fortunately, we were leaving the next day for another Game Park to stay for a few days. They had plenty of hot water and power. School holidays had finished so it was nice and quiet.

Next morning we went to the Hot natural springs for a much enjoyed swim in the warm pools. Late big breakfast then a visit to the pharmacy as I had developed a cough. Codeine linctus was handed over no questions asked. I slept very well that night, no coughing!

Next morning we went to Malabingwa Nature Reserve known for its abundant birdlife, stunning indigenous trees and a wide variety of wildlife where we were driven through with the Ranger who was very knowledgeable and knew where to find the animals. We saw rhinoceros at a distance foraging in the bush. Large groups of giraffe some with babies, meerkats scurrying and being nosey. Wildebeests in large numbers, springbok and their various cousins.

That evening there was the biggest downpour of rain which lasted for a couple of hours, straight down. Power went off for a bit then returned. The next morning the poor gardener was struggling to recover the gravel from the driveways as the rain had taken it all away.

More BBQ's in the lovely evenings with clear, clear skies.

We then had to return to Johannesburg for a couple of days before our journey home. Still no running water. I think memories of Africa will be the beautiful\_countryside, Africans walking everywhere on the roads, many a pothole and great food. Managed to have a proper shower in the Qantas Lounge before flying home.

lan Law gave a vote of thanks.

**Ian** also reported on the Fund-Raising Committee which is meeting every two weeks. The Country Fair and Car Boot Sale are now planned for March next year. Meanwhile President Bob and Will are to address the DA requirements.
