International Toast – Robbie Allan

Rotary Club of Lombok.

On Sunday evening the Indonesian island of Lombok experienced a 6.9 magnitude earthquake which has caused severe damage, disruption and loss of at least 98 lives.

The epicentre of the earthquake was on the north side of a major active volcano, Mount Rinjani and only 48km from the major centre of the island, Mataram.

Mataram is the capital of West Nusa Tenggara Province and has a population of about 440 000, most of whom are living outdoors at the moment.

ShelterBox Australia is currently assessing the needs on the ground and if required will mobilise emergency relief from a number of stores in

Australia, New Zealand and elsewhere.

The Rotary Club of Mataram Lombok was Chartered in 1988 in District 3420 which covers western Indonesia. Its 10 Members led by President Ninik Green are sure to be working hard to assist in the relief and recovery effort.

During normal times the Club's main project is partnering with a Belgian Club facilitating cleft palette repairs to the children of Lombok under Operation Cleft.



Guest Speaker – Dr John Hewson



Rod Aistrope introduced John who serves with him on the Board of Challenge Southern Highlands. Rod gave a lengthy introduction which lead John to recall an anecdote by Winston Churchill – "I sound like a pretty interesting chap I can hardly wait to hear myself speak".

John Hewson said he is an Analyst forecasting the world economies. Here is a brief summary of his talk:

The liquidity of the 80 and 90's.

The Global Financial Crisis (GFC) – too much liquidity into the system.

President Donald Trump – no increase in U.S. standard of living and wages not going up. U.S.

Companies not employing or paying higher wages but increasing dividend payments.

U.S. Banks sub-prime lending. Lending 125% value of homes with no recourse.

GFC reduced debt now Global Debt 40-45% higher.

Today is unpredictable – no comparison in history.

Stock Market overvalued.

Liquidity overvalued in property prices.

100% debt in the U.S. Tax cuts not funded and adding more to debt.

European economy is not stimulating investment.

Germany is doing well because it is stimulated by its export industry.

Greece economy has shrunk more than a third. 180% GDP and youth unemployment high.

Europe is flooded by maximum immigration.

The pressure on the European economy may result in fragmentation.

Theresa May on how to exit Brexit. Now a minority Government not a 100-seat majority as she expected after the last election. In a chaotic and weak position.

Tensions in the Middle East.

Trump totally incompetent. A complex person and more a TV Host and Property Developer.

China is our most important Trade Partner. Growth rates strong. China has the highest debt in the world. Corruption, aging population – 250,000,000 over 60. Structural problems and social unrest.

Tension between China and U.S.A. is worrying to Australia. China has money pouring into The Pacific. The relationship we should be developing is Indonesia – the potential is enormous.

Australia has had 27 years of consecutive growth. Infrastructure is unfunded. Debt in 1920-21 could rise from 3.5 Billion to 22 Billion. Cutting tax and spending money does not reduce debt. Power costs, health insurance, housing costs, cost of schooling, cost of living, mortgage stress, etc. These problems will not be solved by giving tax cuts. Interest rates are so low yet the cost of living has gone up.

Electricity and Gas costs is bad Government Policy. As Paul Keating said – Politics is a game - scoring points,

The bottom line is life is harder and we failed as a generation. Our Kids will be excluded from housing. Job security has evaporated.
