For the immediate future, the style of meeting is a bit uncertain. It depends on how many people are coming.


Please bear with Rod and Trevor for now. Some meetings may be via Zoom.

The Comoros Islands were occupied by Portugal in 1503 as a colony until France took over in 1886.

The new nation became independent in 1975. It has a population of 850 000 and its capital is Moroni.

The Rotary Club of Moroni was Chartered in District 9220 in 1965 and has 13 Members led by President Abou Cheikh.

It recently conducted the National High School Chess Championship and has a health support project in the Moroni High School.

Kristen's talk was about the importance of birth certificates, especially in the developing world.

People need birth certificates for

Vaccinations Education Bank accounts

Passports

There are estimated to be 1 billion people in the world without a birth certificate. Governments cannot provide services if they do not know who is requiring these services. Human traffickers prey on children with out birth certificates as they are basically untraceable.

Countries can do the following to improve the accessibility to a birth certificate

- Reduce the distance to access a birth certificate
- 2. Reduce the cost of getting a birth certificate
- 3. Simplify the process
- 4. Remove discrimination
- Increase demand by raising public awareness

What can we do?

Change occurs where there is awareness. Everyone needs to raise the awareness of the need to have a birth certificate.

After the presentation members discussed the issue of having no birth certificate. Even in Australia late last century seasonal workers did not have birth certificates and therefore were not able or made it more difficult to get a bank account.
