Amesbury is a town and civil parish in the county of Wiltshire England and is 70 miles south west of London.It is known for a number prehistoric monuments and sites, including Stonehenge, I have a personal connection to the town as it is my birth place.

The town is claimed to be the oldest occupied settlement in Great Britain having first been settled in 8820bc. The parish includes a number of hamlets and part of Boscombe Down military airfield.


Amesbury is located in southern Wiltshire,7 miles north nor east of Salisbury. It sits on the river Avon valley on the southern fringes of Salisbury Plain and has historically been considered an important river crossing area on the road to Exeter.

In 2002,at an Amesbury dig, the discovery of the richest Bronze Age burial site yet to be found in Britain, the remains of two men apparently of aristocratic rank were accompanied by over 100 objects including arrow heads, copper knives, and the earliest worked gold in the country, the occupant of the more richly furnished grave has become known as the Amesbury Archer.

Amesbury is a small town, the town centre boasts a hotel, restaurant and 4 pubs. Antrobus House is a venue for a number of community organisations to meet, including The Rotary club of Amesbury. The club was chartered in 1958, it is one of 1845 Rotary clubs in the Uk and Ireland with over 57000 members. The club is in district 1110 along with 65 other clubs and cover an area of almost all of Hampshire, the eastern part of Dorset, the southern part of Wiltshire, the Isle of Wight and the Channel Isles.

In the past year the club has supported local and national charities including Children's Chance, Scouts, Stroke Foundation and Youth clubs. The President of the Club is Graham Browning, I wrote to Graham last week sending him greetings from President Robbie and our Club and further shared with him that at about 18.45 hrs on Tuesday 8th July the Rotary club of Bowral- Mittagong in the Southern Highlands of NSW would be toasting the Rotary Club of Amesbury Wiltshire, its members and their work.

Her desire to give back to her new community and her recognition of Rotary as a place not only for service but also for friendship and connection speaks volumes about her values.

Catherine, we are delighted to have you join our Rotary family. You bring with you kindness, purpose, and a willingness to serve qualities that will enrich our club and the community we support.

Guest Speaker - Dr David Browning



PP Bob Miller introduced our guest speaker this evening:

Dr David Browning, was trained in obstetrics and gynaecology at Guy's Hospital in London prior to migrating to live in rural Australia in 1967. David set up practice in Bowral in 1974 and continued as the local specialist obstetrician and gynaecologist for well over 30 years. He is an active member of St Jude's Church, a pastoral worker in Bowral Public and Private Hospitals and a member of Kairos team in Goulburn Goal.

In 2009 David, with his son **Dr Andrew Browning** founded the **Barbara May Foundation** to raise funds to support the work of his sister Valerie Browning and son Andrew had already started building and running hospitals in Ethiopia.

David was awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia in 2004 for service to medicine, particularly as an obstetrician and gynaecologist, and significant contribution to the community of

Bowral and the surrounding district.

In the process of developing background on David, I happened to ask a number of locals what they knew about this David Browning. The most frequent and gratifying response being David delivered all our babies.

David, it is a privilege on this evening having you join us.

David and Daphne arrived in Australia in 1966 and moved to the tiny town of Guyra. While death in childbirth is extremely rare in Australia, it is very common in many parts of Africa In 1959, Emperor Haille Selassie of Ethiopia advertised in the British Medical Journal for medical help with difficult births. He had lost a daughter through childbirth. Drs Reg and Catherine Hamlin answered the ad. In Addis Ababa they started training midwives and built a hospital. They discovered a huge problem with Fistula damage causing incontinence, bowel damage and resultant social rejection. Ethiopia is a large country with a population of over 100 million people and is extremely mountainous. David's sister, Valerie went to the country in 1973 and eventually stayed and is working in the plains area on the coast. She married Ismail and, between them, they get involved in fixing medical problems as well as engineering, veterinary problems etc. They have trained over 1000 people in midwifery etc.

David showed a video of the hospital built by the Barbara May Foundation showing the work they do helping pregnant women and training staff. Often patients arrived with serious complications making treatment much harder. They have since built a second hospital in the North of the country and a third is about to be opened.

David's son, **Dr Andrew Browning** started in Ethiopia with the Hamlins and has since moved to Tanzania where the same problems exist. He continues the work of the Barbara May Foundation as a fistula surgeon. They have trained many locals and he now has helped establishing medical support in many locations throughout sub-Saharan Africa.

Surgery can change the life of these women from social outcast back to a normal existence. Apart from physical repair, the psychological recovery is just as important. A number of questions followed.

Rosemary Kelly gave a vote of thanks to David for an inspiring presentation.

The Raffle was picked by David Browning and Steve Escott won.

Barbara Humphries ran a quiz for 'A historic House in the Southern Highlands'. The answer was Wandevan House in Mittagong once the home of Edmund Barton.

Sergeant Lynton reminded us about the Chariots of Fire movie and ran a short fine session. He also described his recent visit to Korea and the DMZ and speculated about the possibilities for Rotary of building a fence/tunnel across the Wingecarribee River.

The meeting was closed by President Robbie.
