#### **BRIDGES OUT OF POVERTY**

Each week we say to each other "I am proud to be a Rotarian!" after we pledge, pray and recite the Four-Way Test. But what does it mean and are we living up to what we say?

In October Reno Rotary contributed \$2,500 to Northern Nevada Connections (NNC), a Bridges Out of Poverty project that was started by Reno Central Rotary. The Bridges program was brought to Northern Nevada by Cherie Jameson of the Northern Nevada Food Bank and helps those in poverty help them themselves. NNC is a program that allows Area 8 Rotarians to interact with partners including the Food Bank, Housing Authority and groups that are critical to helping solve poverty in our area.

Poverty can be generational, one generation to the next stuck in poverty, or situational in which a life event has led to poverty. In most cases those in poverty at least have a roof over their head and is different than homelessness. As David Crumbley, Past President of Reno Central and primary force behind NNC told us October 2, "...the homeless have different service needs than those that are simply stuck in poverty." In the case of poverty, most lack access to needed resources and services and may not know how to access resources that may be available.

This is the second year Reno Rotary has financially supported NNC and it is an evolving program that will make a difference for those wanting to work their way out of poverty. Individuals must apply for and be selected to enter the program and must commit to attending 20 consecutive Monday evening sessions. At each session they are provided a warm meal, opportunity for fellowship with volunteers and then participate in a focused training session on a variety of life skill topics

to help them prepare for and access resources that most of us take for granted.

Local Rotarians can participate as volunteers in variety of ways including leadership of the NNC, teacher/facilitators, mentors and allies of those in the program. This is a Rotary program you should consider supporting.

One of the easiest is to help provide the evening meal. A special Thanksgiving dinner was served on November 20 and Reno Rotary honorary members Gretchen Hughs and Tasha Hall helped cook and provide dinner for 40 attendees
