MONDAY'S PROGRAM Katie Morales

Supporting Education of Homeless Children and Youth



Katie Morales was born and raised in Reno. She earned a bachelor's degree from University Nevada Reno in Human Development Family Studies.

Katie has been an advocate for the educational rights of homeless students for the last 10 years. She oversees the

implementation of the federal McKinney-Vento Act and Foster program in Washoe County School District, which identifies and provides resources to over 3,600 students experiencing homelessness and/or Foster care. She has worked closely with Washoe County and the State to improve the educational outcomes for children and youth in homeless situations.

The Rotary club of Reno has provided a \$7,500 community service grant to the Children in Transition (CIT) program put in place to satisfy the requirements of the McKinney-Vento Act (non-funded federal mandate). The CIT program includes a variety of support strategies focused on ensuring homeless students are provided with stability, security, and a safe place to learn. The target population is birth through 12th grade and CIT Homeless Liaisons work with schools and families to identify and address students' basic needs such as shelter, food, clothing, transportation and health care.

Homeless students may or may not have parents, a temporary location is not unusual as homeless

students frequently move around the community often changing schools, and a number of students are from the Record Street homeless center. Reno Rotary's assistance supports the after school tutoring conducted at the Bresson Boys and Girls Club and transportation after the tutoring sessions. Reno Rotary also secured a \$2,000 district service grant to provide clothing for students. All elements of the CIT program are intended to normalize and main stream homeless students in ways that will enhance their opportunities for success.

APPLY TODAY FOR THE ROTARY DISTRICT SCHOLARSHIP

scholarship amount: \$3,000 club application deadline: APRIL 2, 2018

ELIGIBILITY:

Eligible students include high school seniors and undergraduate level students who attend a trade school, community college, or a university located in District 5190. Scholarship money is available for one year and can be used for tuition, books, supplies, and other educational needs. Must be accepted to an accredited college or university in the United States.

District Grant Scholarships provide funds to help offset the cost of one year of study at the undergraduate level at any accredited college or university in the United States. The prospective scholar must complete the application and submit it to a local Rotary Club in District 5190. A club committee interviews and selects a qualified applicant for recommendation to the district 5190 Scholarship Committee, which conducts interviews and makes the final selection of District Scholars.

Rotary's conflict-of-interest policy related to individuals receiving grant funds requires that the applicant does not fit in any of the categories below: Rotarian, including honorary Rotarian, employee of a club, district, or other Rotary entity, or of Rotary International; spouse, lineal descendant (child or grandchild by blood, legal adoption, or marriage without adoption); spouse of lineal descendants; or ancestor (parent or grandparent by blood) of person(s); employee of an agency, organization, or institution that partners with The Rotary Foundation or Rotary International; former Rotarian or honorary Rotarian who has terminated membership within the preceeding 36 months; person who is ineligible based on family relationship to a former Rotarian or honorary Rotarian, for a period of 36 months after termination of family member's membership.
