Dr. Randall Todd

Washoe County Health Department

Upcoming Flu Season



Randall Todd is the Division Director for Epidemiology and Public Health Preparedness at the Washoe County Health District. This position also includes oversight of Vital Records and Emergency Medical Services. Dr.

Todd has held this position since 2005.

Prior to his arrival in Washoe County, Dr. Todd served as the Nevada State Epidemiologist from 1993 to 2005. During this time he had programmatic responsibility for communicable disease investigation as well as the HIV, STD, Immunization, TB, Cancer Registry, Tobacco Control, Diabetes, and Breast and Cervical Cancer programs.

Prior to coming to Nevada, Dr. Todd served as the Director of Health Promotion and Disease Prevention for the Kent County Health Department in Grand Rapids Michigan. Dr. Todd earned a DrPH in preventive care from Loma Linda University in 1979 as well as a MPH in health education from the same institution. He currently serves on the adjunct faculty at the University of Nevada, Reno where he teaches a course on outbreak investigation.

Luncheon and Awards • September 13, 2018

RENO, Nev. (Sep. 13, 2018) - Ten winners were announced today at the 2018 “EDAWN Arts & Business Luncheon and Awards” held at the Eldorado Resort Casino. This event was held in partnership with the City of Reno, City of Sparks, Sierra Arts Foundation, UNR College of Liberal Arts and the Economic Development Authority of Western Nevada (EDAWN) to recognize local businesses and individuals in Greater Reno-Sparks that have demonstrated exceptional support and engagement with the local arts and culture community. More than 45 entries were submitted and over 400 local business representatives, government leaders, and individuals in the arts community attended the event.

In a unique partnership between the Reno Arts & Culture Commission, the City of Reno and the Rotary Club of Reno, the Reno Sculpture Garden in Bicentennial Park was launched in November, 2016 as a rotating outdoor exhibition that is an integral part of Reno's growing public art program. The Sculpture Garden was a culmination of two years of conceptual, structural and logistical planning that began in April of 2014 and will now continue as art has been selected for the coming two-year cycle.

The project emerged as the Rotary Club of Reno was considering ways in which to celebrate its 100th anniversary as the first of the Rotary clubs in Nevada. They were looking for a high-impact project that directly benefitted the downtown area where the Club was located. The Rotary and the City of Reno made an on-going commitment to the Park and the new round of sculptures will be installed this summer.

In addition to enhancing the cityscape with the sculptures, the Club has also helped landscape the park. Initially they spent about \$2,000 in landscaping and tools and contributed 200 volunteer hours during that time. Beautification expanded beyond the triangular shape of Bicentennial Park, moving west as far as the half-wall near the Hub coffee shop on Riverside Drive.

Rotary also created The Biggest Little Bulb Project, started in fall 2017. They raised \$6,000 for the purchase of the bulbs and planted 15,000 bulbs (!) and consider this another cornerstone of its Reno beautification plan. The club's ongoing commitment to the gardens ranges from \$5,000-\$10,000 annually and volunteer participation was enormous, with over 50 people joining in and contributing over 150 hours of service.

One of the unique features of the Sculpture Garden is that the art is for sale and supports local artists and the creative economy. The artists loaned their work to the project but it is a giant outdoor gallery for them to showcase their work. The Sculpture Garden has transformed Bicentennial Park. By adding this artistic element, the Park is now a friendly environment for all people downtown, visitors and locals alike.
