Here we are at the end of our Rotary year. Let's look back on what we've accomplished together.

Membership and Club Development:

- *The new Rotary Club of Passport to Amador was chartered with 35 members
- *Three new Rotary Community Corps were formed all in Amador County
- *A ROTEX chapter was formed for returning Rotary Youth Exchange students
- *We are poised to have membership growth at the end of June as compared with July 1 of last year

The Rotary Foundation:

*We surpassed our goals in Rotary Foundation contributions for both the Annual Fund and Polio Plus, with more to be added this month.

All Clubs have contributed to Polio Plus

Only 2 Clubs have not contributed to the Annual Fund – Chester and Ely

- *100% of our District Service Grant funds were allocated to our clubs by October, and several additional grants were pending by the time funds were committed
- *The introduction of the Triple Crown Donor program, recognizing Rotarians who are Major Donors, Paul Harris Society members and Bequest Society members.
- *Two Global Scholars were studying in London and Dublin with our sponsorship
- *The District contributed \$25,000 to Polio Plus and \$25,000 to the Peace Fellow Endowment

Training and Leadership Development:

- *The Rotary Leadership Institute was revitalized and several courses were held this year, with over 100 participants
- *The new Avenues of Service seminar in September was well-received and provided great ideas for clubs

Recognition:

- *Projects of the Year, Clubs of Excellence, Club of the Year, and many other projects and categories were presented to clubs at the District Conference
- *As of this date, 25 of our 57 eligible clubs have qualified for the Rotary Citation, RI's highest club-level honor, with additional clubs still to qualify

Administration:

- *Three important district documents have been updated the district operating procedures, youth protection policies and the crisis management plan
- *A successful District Conference had 440 Rotarians and guests in attendance, and presented a full program of activities and events

Camp Atlantis, District 5190's conference celebrating the great work of all 57 clubs during District Governor Doug's 2017-2018 year, was fun, inspiring and jam packed with all sorts of camping metaphors!

During the day on Friday, 62 golfers from throughout the District played in the District Golf tournament at Red Hawk Golf Course. The event was chaired by Reno Rotarian, Craig Wesner. The Rotary Club of Penn Valley won the tournament; congrats to Mark Fleming, Dan Halloran and Dave Walker for a job well done.

Friday's kick off dinner featured Rotary International President Representative Mark Kreibel's welcome, poking fun at DG Doug with memories and pictures of Doug's past Boy Scout days. Auburn's President Bob Santin serenaded the audience with Tales from the Trails. Everyone, especially the Rotary Youth Exchange students, danced the night away to VAMP, Reno Midtown's Rock and Roll Rotarian dance band.

Saturday's Reveille breakfast featured keynote speaker Heidi Kuhn, founder of Roots for Peace. This international nonprofit organization, based in Northern California, seeks to create improved living conditions in war torn regions through the eradication of landmines, and to replanting crops to aid the impoverished famers in those areas.

Interesting and informative sessions held throughout the day on Saturday included the Speech and Music contests, Facilitator and Grants management training, Conflict Management, Public Speaking and Running an Effective meeting. Lunch highlighted our district youth with guest speaker Elsa Beljean's delightful presentation, equating a non-camper's viewpoint with the tenants of the Boy Scouts, plus presentations by Rotary Youth Exchange student Anael Mandine from France, who is hosted by the Rotary Club of Portola, and Rotary Youth Leadership Awakening alumni Alexis Reel. Also featured was the District's Speech Contest winner Vanessa Ribeiro, from the Reno area. Finals of the Pinewood Derby were held right after lunch with the car from Rotary Club of Pollock-Pines Camino was first, Fallon Club was second, and Minden Club was third. The Design award went to Reno Central.

Glamorous camping, or Glamping, was the focus of Saturday dinner, featuring the Music Contest winner Max Yang, an accomplished pianist from Area 8, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Sparks. Attendees also enjoyed the sounds of the Reed High School Jazz Combo. RI President's Rep, Mark Kriebel talk on the year's theme, "Rotary Making a Difference", inspired the audience to rise to new heights through the many avenues of service available through Rotary.

The culminating event featured the incoming presidents' elect who will work with DGE Tina to "Hit it out of the Park" this next year. A great time was had by all!



Re: Pakuranga Rotary's NZ Coach Tour 2019.



The Rotary Club of Pakuranga, District 9920 (Auckland, New Zealand), have recently concluded running another Unique Coach Tour of New Zealand specifically designed for Australian and American Rotarians and we are now moving to the promotion of our 2019 Tour.

However, we have found it most difficult to create the awareness of this opportunity within our designated sectors of the Rotary world. We cannot afford to advertise in 'The Rotarian' and/or 'Rotary Down Under' and although we have previously had good cooperation from selected District Governors who have placed our promotional article in their DG Newsletter, we have had to resort to emailing the Rotary Club Presidents or

Secretaries from details within the RI Directory.

As it happened, we had two Past District Governors on this year's Tour. One was from NSW, Australia, and one from California, USA. Both have given me their okay to tell you who they are, and to also detail their 'End of Tour Comments' as follows:

1) PDG Barbara Tracy (& Jim), District 5180 (Greater Sacramento area) California, USA.

Comments: (My explanatory comments have been added in red.)

Our group got along really well, and Sharron was incredible. When something was suggested (e.g. the plane ride, the glow worms, etc.) it was rare that we didn't all decide to go along. (Sharron is a professional

Tour Guide and is with them throughout the Tour.)

This was a great trip. We enjoyed every moment and really appreciated the opportunity to see some things that larger tour groups couldn't have seen. Of course, this was made possible by the knowledge base of our guide and the small size of our group. We also took some alternative routes so people could see additional places of interest. We met some wonderful people, some of whom we look forward to seeing again in Toronto. (At the 2018 International Convention)



Husband Jim (PP South Sacramento Rotary) also added:

Sharron Hickman is the very best tour guide we've ever experienced. In combination with driver Damian Nowak, they were a great team.

The many additions that Sharron made as we went (some seemingly on the fly) added a lot of value to our maiden voyage to New Zealand, including: The raw cheese and model railroad; Bill Richardson's Transport Museum in Invercargill (and the world's fastest Indian); Van Brandenburg Architects. Oamaru – Ian Anderson limestone sculpture; and

Lockwood Homes in Rotorua.

Sharron's knowledge and connections were very helpful. The little towns where we stopped for mid-morning breaks and for lunch were wonderfully delightful. The plane ride from Lake Tekapo over the Southern Alps and the Glaciers was amazing. It was totally worth the cost, and we were so fortunate to have great weather for flying. (Pakuranga Rotarian volunteers picked up all attendees from the airport and drove them to their Hotel.) To be able to share fellowship over a beautiful meal with Wayne and Glenda was a privilege and so appreciated. (All attendees attended a home hosted meal with a Pakuranga couple on their second night in Auckland.)

Our sincere appreciation to the Rotary Club of Wellington North for their welcome. We felt that perhaps the Rotary

Meeting would be a little better if there was a chance to have an evening gathering as more Fellowship could be shared. But in saying that, the experience at Wellington was outstanding. (The Tour Group attended a Luncheon Meeting with the Wellington North Club.) Queenstown was outstanding where we thoroughly appreciated our hosting in the home of Keith and Heather McIntosh. They were wonderful people and so kind. To have Rotarian Russell collect us from the Hotel the following day and spend his time showing us all around Queenstown was so special and very much appreciated. (All the Tour Group were home hosted to a meal with a Queenstown Rotarian.)



Being a small group was excellent and we would recommend that the party is kept to a low number for obvious reasons. (Our 2018 Tour group size was 10. Although we would prefer more, we do intend to limit the size to about 20.) Damian was outstanding as a driver and Sharron was wonderful in her role as Guide. She went well past the contract, and it was appreciated. Peter, I am not sure on your selection criteria for future trips but I have a lovely couple from our Rotary Club in Cessnock who would love to be a part of your next trip. (Our only selection criteria is that they are Rotarians and their partners/friends.)

MESSAGE FROM RYE STUDENT......Being an exchange student, mean so much more to me than I thought it could ever mean. I've grown with every second that passed, every step I took, every memory that I've made and every conversation I had. But because there is no way to put 10 months into a sentences, here are something that the word "exchange" truly means.

Exchange is strong. It's the power to say goodbye to your family and friends, to put your whole life in one suitcase, it's to leave your country, and the life you know so well. It's to know that you don't know what to expect and to still get on that plane into a whole new world.

Exchange is being scared. Being scare of the fact that you are going to live with people that you actually never met before, of knowing that you have no one on the other side of the world that you know. It's being scared of losing those you've left behind, being scared of the fact that you could fail.

Exchange is realizing how every stone that's in your way is a chance. A chance to make the right decision, a chance to realize that being different is worth celebrating and the only way to learn is to make mistakes.

Exchange is celebrating life to the fullest. Having fun with friends that you make for a lifetime, having topics that you could never have at your school in your home country. It's going to that bonfire and having s'mores and laughing with your people. It's sitting in that car with the windows down on the way to a different part of the country that you haven't seen yet with sunglasses on, music playing and just realizing how lucky you are to have this opportunity.

Exchange is laughing. About mistakes that you make, words that you pronounce or use wrong, it's laughing about all the stupid little things that happens and knowing that "nobody knows you here". That you are not being judged in any way and for me this mean freedom. The freedom to be the best version of myself.


Exchange is like flying and falling hard. After every high there is a low. And sometimes, it's deeper than you expect it to be. It's missing your family and your friends, it's missing a good bread, missing chocolate, or missing fries. It's missing a life that is so very difference from the one that you are living right now and that seems far out of reach.

Exchange is being afraid to go home. Because home will never be home the way that it used to be. You've grown, got more independent, way better skills in the language that you spoke, thought in, and dreamt in during 10 months. But most of all exchange is about realizing and knowing. It's realizing who you are, you create yourself new, because no one expects you to be a certain kind of person or act a certain way. It's suddenly knowing that home is where your heart is but also being aware of the fact that your heart is split in half spread across the ocean.

And exchange never leaves you. What you learn and experienced stay a part of you. Simply thinking will remind you of your time passes here. When you see pictures that you took with your friends. When you talk in the language that is not that foreign anymore to you. When you skype with the people that you're still in touch with. It's a second home, not only for those 10 months but forever and that's the beauty of exchange. You come back with more than you had before. In your mind, heart, and your suitcase.
