Exploring the Marshall Islands



The Marshall Islands cover more than 700.000 square miles yet their combined landmass is equal only to the size of Washington, D.C. Land is both sacred to the Marshallese as a society and to their individual

identity. Dispossessed of their northern islands by radiation from nuclear testing and now squeezed into the southern islands, even that refuge is being overwhelmed by the rising waters caused by global warming, yet another tragedy caused by external forces. In summer 2023 thirty artists from around the world, as well as the Marshall Islands, began an art and science project in the islands aboard two research vessels. Fox, who served as the official chronicler of the voyage, is writing multiple essays and returning in February of this year to continue the work. His talk is a progress report to date about the islands and the project.

Jacques Yammine

March 4, 1924- January 26, 2024



It is with great sadness that we announce the death of Jacques Louis Yammine of Reno, Nevada, who passed away on January 26, 2024, at the age of 99, leaving to mourn family and friends.

He was predeceased by his wife Lorena

Schaake Yammine; and his sister Afaf (Fifi). He is survived by his children, Jeannie, Susan and Louis; and his sister Sally. He is also survived by 5 grandchildren and 3 great-grandchildren, many nephews, nieces, great-nieces and great-nephews, and cousins.

Jacques Yammine joined our club in March 1995 and was a 26 year member of Reno Rotary. Jack was an active member of Reno Rotary and served on the International Service Committee. Always well dressed and neat as a pin, Jack held the classification "Export" in our club.

Jack was born in Zghorta in North Lebanon March 4, 1924. Jack's parents were both Lebanese – His father worked for the British government and Jack's mother, Hanneh Morcos, was a housewife. Fluent in Arabic, French, and English Jack graduated from the American University of Beirut with a degree in hospital administration. He had a prolific career before and after immigrating to the US. For many years Jack traveled back to Lebanon to continue work that was started prior to coming to the US. He was well respected there just as he was here in Reno.

Jack produced a biographical summary and copies were given to all the Rotarians that attended the Reno Rotary meeting when his 95th birthday was celebrated. Jack's life history made for interesting reading and the


