commitment to operational excellence, financial stewardship, and strategic planning has propelled the Foundation to new heights in service and impact.

The Reno Rodeo Foundation was established in 1986 as a private foundation to ensure that proceeds from the annual Reno Rodeo—a historic and widely celebrated community event produced by volunteers since 1919—would directly benefit the residents of Northern Nevada. While this structure allowed the Foundation to distribute funds effectively, its classification as a private foundation limited its ability to expand fundraising efforts beyond the Reno Rodeo Association's direct contributions. To increase financial sustainability, diversify funding sources, and enhance its ability to receive grants, corporate sponsorships, and tax-deductible donations from the public, the Foundation transitioned to a 501(c)(3) public charity in 2004. This reclassification provided significant legal and financial advantages, including eligibility for broader philanthropic support, tax-exempt status for donors. and compliance with federal guidelines that prioritize public benefit organizations. As a result, the Foundation has been able to expand its reach, increase financial transparency, and better serve Northern Nevada's children and families

#### **Current Programs & Impact**

Today, the Reno Rodeo Foundation serves abused, neglected, and at-risk children across 14 Northern Nevada counties through impactful programs, including:

- Scholarships for undergraduate students at accredited local colleges and universities
- The Reno Rodeo Wish program, granting life-changing experiences to children in need
- The annual **Denim Drive**, providing purchase cards to social workers for foster children's essentials (clothing, coats, shoes, hygiene items)

 Reading Rooms, offering new books and teddy bears to children navigating family court

With the dedication of nearly 1,000 Reno Rodeo volunteers, the Reno Rodeo Foundation continues to maximize community partnerships, financial impact, and long-term support for Northern Nevada's children. While the Foundation has expanded far beyond its original role as the charitable arm of the Reno Rodeo, the Reno Rodeo Association remains our largest donor, ensuring that proceeds from the area's biggest and longest-running annual professional sports event directly benefit children in need. Through its growing scope, the Reno Rodeo Foundation has solidified its identity as a trusted leader in children's services, leveraging its resources to create lasting, meaningful change.

#### McKinna Jackson, 2025 Miss Reno Rodeo

McKinna Jackson is a 23-year-old native Nevadan. McKinna was raised in Gardnerville, NV, where she graduated from Douglas High School. Following graduation, she then went on to earn her certificate from Texas Horseshoeing School, located in Scurry, TX. After refining her farrier skills, McKinna realized that home truly means Nevada and returned to Gardnerville. At only 19, alongside her mother and biggest supporter, Kim, McKinna launched a new business, the Mad Dog Cafe.

In addition to her enthusiasm for outdoor activities, McKinna is passionate about being involved in her community. She contributes her time on the Board of Directors for the Carson Valley Roping Club as the Vice President and she is able to pour into her passion for team roping. Outside of the saddle, McKinna enjoys volunteering with her local Fire Department and to her favorite philanthropy, Between Horses and Humans; a local non-profit program dedicated to supporting youth in developing life skills through horsemanship.

A gesture that saves lives: Rotary brings hope and state-of-the-art medicine to the Hospital in Stei By Sorin Martin Veres

In an impressive gesture of international solidarity, 16 Rotary clubs from Romania, Europe, and the United States have donated a state-of-the-art medical device to the Stei City Hospital, intended for digestive investigations. The high-resolution endoscopy equipment, valued at 126,000 dollars, will fundamentally change the way gastrointestinal conditions are diagnosed and treated in the area.



The equipment handover event took place in the presence of numerous delegations of Rotarians from the Rotary clubs of Oradea, Beius, Cluj-Napoca, Satu Mare, Budapest, and not least, from the United States of America. The moment was filled with emotion, generosity, and gratitude, especially since the donation was made in honor of an outstanding Rotarian – Bob Pagett. Although he could not be present, his daughter, Michelle, proudly represented the family and the spirit of her father.

With the help of the new equipment, doctors in Stei will be able to perform vital investigations such as gastroscopies and colonoscopies, without patients having to travel to other cities. Thus, tens of thousands of residents in the area will directly benefit from this life-saving investment.

**David Gallagher, the representative of the clubs in the USA**, spoke emotionally about the involvement of partners: "The project in Stei is the 112th completed worldwide by Rotary International. It is a clear proof that when Rotarians join forces, regardless of the continent, they can change lives. Here, in Stei, I felt what it means to be part of a global community with a soul."
