FROM THE PRESIDENT'S CLUB CAR

Hey, Hey, Hey! It's Pay it Forward Day

Culminating six months of reading and learning about kindness, the 5th and 6th grade students have realized a dream of holding a "Pay It Forward" Day on campus at C. Roy Carmichael Elementary School in Portola. And, what a day it was on Friday, March 20th! It was the inspiration of one of the 5th grade student members of our newly formed "Pay It Forward Club", a joint effort of Portola Rotary Club and our local grammar school.



Pay It Forward (PIF) Day followed a week of student activities lead by our young PIF Club members, with Rotarians and the school librarian, Klytia Dutton as

mentors. We are so proud of them all for introducing the "kindness" concept to the student body! They read to all the younger students, shared a "kindness" video in the upper grades and lead discussions in all classrooms. The activities were developed by the PIF Club after reading a special book with us in the school book club last fall.

As background explanation for the story, this project has been the 2014-15 RI District Community Grant Project developed by the Portola Rotarians. Our Rotary club recognized a need in the local community to help young people learn about kindness at a very vulnerable age. We proposed an innovative "Pay It Forward" Literacy and Youth Leadership Project to the principal of C. Roy Carmichael Elementary School (CRC) as follows: Offer 5th and 6th grade students the opportunity to read an inspirational book about kindness and learn to apply the principles with the help of Rotarians and school leaders. The principal accepted our proposal with the caveat that we make sure it was student driven for optimum understanding.

The book we chose was first written about ten years ago by Catherine Ryan Hyde, having been recently revised for a young reader. It is called PAY IT FORWARD. In the book, a social studies teacher asks his students to "THINK OF SOMETHING TO CHANGE THE WORLD AND PUT IT INTO ACTION." The story revolves around a 12 year old boy whose world changing idea was to practice kind acts towards others and encourage the recipient to pay the kindness forward rather than thank him for the deed. His hope was that exponentially the world would become a kinder place by paying deeds forward. It seemed simple, right? And, so the story goes...

Over the course of the last six months we have read the thought provoking book with our students in a book club format, held great discussions, given good guidance and helped the students develop possible "kindness" projects of their own for their school. One of those great ideas has been to hold a "Pay It Forward Day" on campus. Other projects that the students accomplished with our help included: serving meals at our service project community supper, collecting books for the "Little Free Library" project, practicing random acts of kindness in downtown Portola to complete strangers, and becoming "Welcome Ambassadors" all new students that begin class mid-year, complete with a welcome package and letter.





Have we helped them understand what kindness can do

for their school? We hope so! We hope we have equipped them with the tools to create a kindness culture for themselves, their community and the world, perhaps. It is impossible to predict what results can occur tomorrow, next week or next year. One can be sure that the club will continue because the students want it to succeed and we, Rotarians, will continue our journey to instill "selflessness" in our youth!



TAHOE-DOUGLAS ROTARIAN DELIVERS AID TO MALAWI FLOOD VICTIMS

A few weeks ago I awoke to a phone call at 6:30 a.m.. Upon seeing the +44 country code I immediately knew it was ShelterBox, calling to ask if I would deploy to a disaster somewhere in the world. This time the disaster was a flood in Malawi and they wanted to know how quickly I could get there. Within hours, I'd sorted out the location of Malawi, made



travel arrangements and headed out on a long trip to a poor land-locked East African country.

The airport terminal in Blantyre, Malawi is small. As I waited in the warm weather outside to have my temperature taken (ebola precaution), I noticed familiar green ShelterBoxes being loaded off the tarmac on to a truck. A comforting sight, because it meant other ShelterBox Response team members were close by. I had a ride out of the airport, but I still had to clear customs without the normally required visa. Fortunately, with only a little extra scrutiny from a supervisor, I was allowed to clear customs.

Our accommodations in Blantyre were reasonable – but within a week they would seem like the Ritz Carlton. That's one thing about responding to remote areas in third world countries – you gain a healthy perspective of what luxury really is.

My assignment on this trip was to head two hours south to Chikwawa. This year's floods were unusually brutal. Thousands of people were displaced as their homes were flooded or simply had their mud and brick homes disintegrate in torrential rains. Our immediate mission was to deliver tents to people living in communal buildings, where they were sleeping shoulder to shoulder and families were separated. There were no outbreaks of diseases like cholera, but we still felt urgency to getting people out of those conditions.

During my first few days, we were able to move 84 families out of communal living conditions into family tents. It's hard to fully appreciate the dignity of a tent, but then it's a lot like the Ritz Carlton that I would return to in Blantyre at the end of the first week. It's a relative thing. The smiles and even laughter seen and heard by the families as they moved into their tents was heartwarming.

During my 16 days in Malawi I came to appreciate the resilience of a peaceful and hardworking people. I tried to imagine how I, with a fifth grade education could "rise" out of a disaster where I lost my home, possessions, and crops. How could I get to a point where I could have electricity, a bike, running water and a house with a concrete floor. I concluded I would herd goats and cattle and strive for my children to be educated. Like many Malawians I would invest in my future through my children. Before that, my restorative journey might start with a ShelterBox tent.
