The speaker was Debbie Plass, VP of Operations at Sierra Nevada Memorial Hospital. She started as a nurse in Mountain View, and has been with SNMH, in various positions, for over 20 years. She's also on the board of Briar Patch Co-op, Vice Chair of the Nevada County Economic Resource Council, and a current competitor in the Center for the Arts Dancing with Our Stars fundraiser (the announcement of which Eric



Trygg approved, and was fined \$5 for). She shared the following info about the hospital:

•The key element is The People – and the goal to make their care The Best

•The hospital donates about 2 million in care to the community every year – she distributed brochures for the Wellness Classes and sheets for each person to carry that listed their current meds – in case of an unexpected trip to the ER.

•The hospital is an affiliate with Dignity Health, but not owned by them. This enables coordination of services and supports Hello Human Kindness in our community.

•Dignity Health, with headquarters in San Francisco, is the 5th largest hospital company in the country – with 39 hospitals in 20 states, about 55,000 employees (809 at SNMH), including 9,000 doctors.

•After a year of planning they converted to Cerner healthcare information technology. The transition has had some glitches, and patient wait time has been increased, but progress is being made as new staff are added and their computer skills enhanced. They are still working on the Patient Portal, and those who would like access may contact her.

•The ER is small, and very busy – with 31,128 patients last year. The goal is to provide "rapid triage" so that the patient sees a provider within 30 minutes. They're also coordinating with the County

on behavioral health services. The Affordable Care Act has created more ER care, and the hospital is also working to help people get the right insurance coverage for themselves.

Carol Lenhard had the lucky ticket, but drew a white marble.
