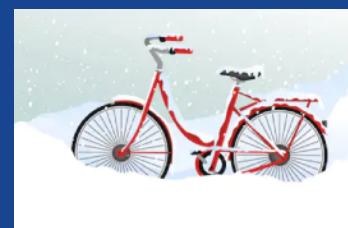

AREA UPDATES

Area 3

The Rotary Clubs of Incline, Tahoe Incline, Truckee and Tahoe City co-sponsored what may have been the most challenging World Polio Day Celebration on record. The event was held October 27, to take advantage of a full day of access to the Nevada State Park at Sand Harbor and the newly opened Tunnel Creek Lakeshore trail extending from Sand Harbor to Incline Village. Everything was beautifully organized and ready to showcase Rotary against the backdrop of “Big Blue”. Temperatures leading up to the event were in the mid sixties with calm lake waters. Then came the arctic blast and temperatures fell like a rock the night before the event. By morning our hardy Rotarians were setting up in a balmy 17 degrees! Winds increased to 25-30 mph as the temperatures climbed to a mere 26 degrees. Can you imagine what the wind chill equated to?

Attendance was anticipated to be more than 150. Not surprisingly, we saw only sixty-one courageous half frozen Rotarians and guests. Thanks to the planning committee’s efforts the media provided valuable coverage of the event, which was noted as an epic event in light of the weather conditions.

Rotary Club of Truckee

The Truckee Club hosted its annual Cadillac Ball November 16. Over the years this event has netted more than \$1.5 million dollars for local charities and public service projects. Seasonal club activities include a Thanksgiving lunch and woodcutting/splitting for low income seniors.

Friday night mixers at private homes and businesses remains an ongoing activity for the club year-round. Early December will see a return of the Annual Downtown Tree Lighting hosted by the club. Santa and his helpers will be on hand to pour hot cocoa for everyone.

Rotary Club of Tahoe City

Fall and early winter is a busy season for this club. Activities start with a free community document shredding event in Tahoe City showcasing the club’s investment in the community. There is also an annual sugar pine seedling planting day in conjunction with the Sugar Pine Foundation, which is committed to restoring the once predominant species of trees in the Tahoe Basin. The club members will be joined by local Interactors and RYLA participants.

December will again see the annual “Santa’s Sledding Party” hosted by the club and the Tahoe City Downtown Association. Open to the community and free to all attendees, there is a pancake breakfast, sled hill, a visit by Santa arriving on a fire engine and gifts for all the kiddies. For decades this annual event has provided warm clothing and gifts for hundreds of the area’s disadvantaged children each year.

Rotary Club of Tahoe-Incline

Recognizing that branding is an important, club leadership aggressively sought out media coverage for the World Polio Day event showcasing Rotary and the fabulous new lakeside Tunnel Creek Trail venue. The club has organized

a workforce housing committee to better engage Rotarians with community leaders in addressing this acute issue. As a result of club efforts to secure a District Grant for a young children's section at the local library, they are currently in the process of installing shelving and the book inventory to address this needed segment of library patrons. This time of year when the club is actively involved in the "Teachers Recognition Program" where exemplary teachers are honored with a ceramic apple and monetary gift by the club. Four awards are provided by the club beginning in November and concluding in May.

Rotary Club of Incline

The club recently concluded a unique offering to the community consisting of training in CPR, First Aid, AED utilization and Narcan for 35 Rotarians and community members. The Club also shares a multi-club grant application (with Tahoe-Incline) that is fostering the development of Co-Op gardens at three local schools. The program training is provided with the assistance of "Urban Roots" of Reno NV. The objective is to educate and train children about nutrition and how they can subsidize family food needs with home gardens in most any location. Plans continue for applying and receiving an Ethiopian NICU Training Global Grant for next year.

And finally, representatives from all five clubs participated in an hour-long interview on our local radio station in recognizing Rotary and their polio eradication efforts as well as all the great projects Rotarians do in support of our community.

It was a great opportunity to promote the various Rotary sponsored activities to take place in the community on that World Polio day. Despite the threat of another power outage, the 4 of the 5 local clubs were able hold their events. Grass Valley held a very successful Pints for Polio at the local 1849 Brewery. Purple pinkies were provided by the Lyman Gilmore Interact Club.

For those of you that have been to REGL, the "Can't Stop the Feeling" melody instantly spurred the kids into the line dancing routine learned by REGL students and taught to other students during PE classes. After two hours the happy dancers were gone, the clean up crew kicked in gear, and the Interact Club treasurer counted out \$791.46 for Rotary's Polio fund. These young men and women never cease to amaze me.

Bringing this World Polio Day story to a close, we need to step into the Modoc County Board of Supervisors chambers. In a single Resolution presented November 12, the Board recognized the efforts of the Rotary Club of Alturas and the

Modoc Middle School Interact Club for their outstanding efforts to improve the lives of others and promote goodwill and peace in our community. The Supervisors noted that the combined funds, when added to the matching Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation funds, will provide vaccines to over 16,000 children all over the globe thereby improving the lives of many who could have been paralyzed by this disease. At the conclusion of the presentation, Interact President Ryan Weber, thanked the Board and said he was surprised by the number of lives that will be better because of their actions. A woman in the audience asked to address the Board. A veteran who has given to her country and community, handed a \$100 bill to Ryan. One small act of kindness leads to another and another... TOGETHER, we SAVE LIVES!

And wouldn't you know, one of our past exchange students, Ryan Newberger from South Lake Tahoe who went to Switzerland in the 2018-2019 exchange year contacted Guy Lease, RYE District 5190 Chair about "A Rotary Day at the UN" on November 9, 2019. Let me share his email...

The weather has pretty much changed to autumn/fall really quick here in the last few days. It's truly baffling how fast the time goes by. I'm loving every second of school and couldn't be happier with the choice I made. Of course it's extremely hard, but it will definitely be worth it in the end. Global Grant

Give Children Hope for Life!

In pre-Chernobyl Ukraine, instances of childhood cancer were few and far between. Unfortunately, in our post-Chernobyl society, that is no longer the case. The Regional Center of Children Oncology and Hematology in Cherkasy opened in May 1993, in response to the rapid increase in the number of children diagnosed with oncologic and related blood diseases in the wake of the Chernobyl disaster. The Center sees 250 children with cancer and/or cancer related diseases annually, with 35 to 40 new children being diagnosed with each year.

Aging infusion, syringe and infusion volumetric pumps are no longer reliable enough to assure accurate administration of the chemotherapy drugs often required to effectively treat children. Seeing firsthand the condition of the equipment available at the Center, Dr. Paliychuk, working with her Rotary Club, initiated a Global Grant to obtain medical equipment to provide more efficient and effective medical treatment to the suffering children. Lack of proper medical equipment prevents administering the chemotherapy drugs required by some treatment protocols, which prevents a chance for recovery to a large number of extremely sick children.

Working with the Rotary Club of Miami-Brickell, Global Grant GG1750546 has been approved by The Rotary Foundation, and upon raising a little more than an additional US \$5,000 in funding, the Regional Center of Children Oncology and Hematology in Cherkasy, Ukraine will be the recipient of nearly US\$55,000 in much needed medical treatment equipment and supplies.
