February RYE Corner

My life has changed, and I am changing with it

In exploring Rotary Youth Exchange, sometimes we get the opportunity to share with you an experience related to past exchanges. This month, Jon Greene, RYE Executive Secretary, has a great story to share. I have often told our host families that by hosting an exchange student, there is a high likelihood that they now have a guide and host when they find themselves in that student's country. The relationships that develop during the three to four-month hosting periods are often fast and deep and lasting, allowing the host parents to watch their "child" grow up and prosper.

In the spring of 1999 Jon's wife, Martha, was the Group Study Exchange team leader on a GSE Team from D5190 to D2230, Poland. In November of 2000 Martha and Jon participated in a National Immunization Day in Ghana. Since their flights required a change of planes in Europe, Jon and Martha decided to spend 10 days in Poland so that Martha could reconnect with Polish Rotarians that she met when on her GSE visit. One of the Rotarians that she met had set up an afternoon for them with a new member of the Rotary Club of Czestochowa who lived in the country.

Because there was snow on the ground, the new Rotarian, Grzegorz, took Jon and Martha on a horse-pulled sleigh ride. Grzegorz's son Kuba (age 14) joined them for the sleigh ride. And the following summer Kuba traveled by himself to Reno and spend 6 weeks with the Greenses. On their next trip to Poland, they stayed with Grzegorz at the same time he was hosting a D5190 RYE student.

In the 2004 - 2005 RYE year, Kuba was an inbound RYE student hosted by Truckee Rotary. Being an avid snowboarder and skateboarder, Truckee was the perfect match for him. After his exchange Kuba returned home, finished high school and then alternated between working in one of Grzegorz's businesses and doing competitive snowboarding and some off-road motorcycle racing. He also returned to Truckee several times to work at ski resorts over the years.

Three years ago Kuba did something we have seen from other Inbound students – he made the decision to settle in the United States and is now living in the Newport Beach, CA area. Several weeks ago Kuba became a member of the Rotary Club of Newport - Balboa. Jon chatted recently with Kuba who told him that when he was inducted into the club, he gave his self-introduction and vocational speech to the club, noting that about half of his presentation was about the impact that Rotary Youth Exchange had on his life. His enthusiasm caused him to actively promote RYE to his fellow students at his Polish high school as well.

Jon and Martha have asked Kuba to write an article for the D5190 newsletter about how RYE has influenced his life. So you will be hearing more of Kuba in the upcoming months. Not only are the host RYE students impacted by this program, the host families, the RYE Committee members and your club members enjoy lasting benefits from having an exchange student in your communities. And I will keep sharing the stories that prove the value of Rotary Youth Exchange.

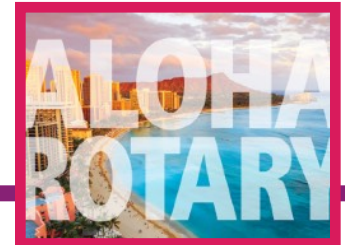
