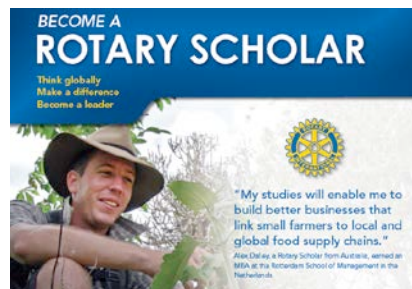

November is a traditional month of thanks. A time to thank our Veterans and remember those we've lost, a time to be grateful as we celebrate our National Thanksgiving Day and a time to thank those who have supported our Rotary Foundation.

Many clubs have special activities scheduled for Veterans Day. There are bagpipes and special presentations planned with invitations to Vets in our local communities. The Thanksgiving Day weekend will find many Rotarians preparing and serving meals in their communities to those less fortunate or unable to prepare for themselves. The Rotarian heart at work.

Our Rotary Foundation helps fund our humanitarian efforts, whether local service projects or global initiatives. Donations to our Foundation are long term investments. The grants and scholarships your donations fund changes individual lives and entire communities, paying dividends years into the future.

This year we've funded our first 2 District Scholarships sending local students to local colleges. A student from Reno is attending UNR and another from Quincy is working towards an associate's degree at Feather River College. Next year this could be someone from your community.



29 District Service Grants are also at work in our Communities representing over \$130k in projects here in District 5190. Some examples include a kitchen remodel at the Boys and Girls Club in Auburn, providing Chrome Books to the Camino School, a financial literacy program for schools in Bishop and a radio transmitter bringing NPR to Surprise Valley and Alturas.

We look forward to additional grant requests as we have extended the application deadline until the end of November or until all of the funds are claimed, whichever happens first.

These funds are available as a result of your generous contributions to our Rotary Foundation's Annual Fund. Fifty cents of every dollar donated returns to our District 3 years later to fund projects such as these.

Globally our District has new projects in Belize, Lebanon, Mexico and Tanzania, with total budgets in excess of another \$125k.

Working Together, That's the Secret

Area 4 Rotary clubs bonded together for a united cause, World Polio Day on October 24th. The idea began small with a passionate member of the Nevada County South (NCS) Rotary Club in Western Nevada County. Kay Stanford is that very passionate member with a desire to end Polio. Even though she was going to be out of the country for 3 months, she started the engine of an idea that we could not let sit idle. Moving with Kay's passion, NCS club's Allen Ostrofe inspired the club to formulate the first of several events to aid in the awareness and end of polio once and for all.

We first looked to jump on the coat-tails of the international initiative and host an awareness and fundraising effort on World Polio Day. As we brainstormed possible event strategies, we landed with the idea of an area wide effort of awareness and fundraising, where each club would raise funds in their community on the World Polio Day. Nevada City's club collected funds in downtown Nevada City, while NCS collected funds at the Fowler center in Grass Valley, and Penn Valley collected at the Holiday Market. A huge thank you to all those who blazed the battle in the field and talked to members of the community while collection donations!

To assist in publicizing the local activities, NCS club's Allison Swartzendruber was able to secure an hour of live radio, where we had a series of interviews from key spokespeople. RRFC Wyn Spiller hosted the interviews with Dr. Bob Scott, Motorcycle Bob (a polio survivor), and another Zone representative. In addition to the interviews, of course the local activities and

efforts were brought to light and the need to truly eradicate Polio.

Building-up to the day of events, NCS club's Mike Austin had arranged for a group photo with all 5 area clubs, including interact club members. The photo was posted in the local newspaper, The Union, courtesy of 49er club's Dave Hemig accompanied by Bob Yazell's article explaining the details of Rotary's efforts.

To aid in publicity, we made sure to blast out information across social media.

Thanks to each club's respective members, photos and informational blurbs may have reached across the world!

To end the day's events, we congregated at Union Square Building 151 in downtown Grass Valley and celebrated everyone's efforts and successes. We tallied funds exceeding \$1200.00, and considering the Gates Foundation 2 for 1 partnership, that accumulates to a total of \$3600.00 raised for Polio. A great first time event that will become a series of annual events until Rotary has truly eradicated Polio!

In conclusion and perhaps most importantly, we saw 5 area clubs come together for the cause of Polio. The multiple avenues of publicity raised awareness of how close we are to ending Polio; but also what Rotary is, how Rotary is making communities better, and how you can join those who put "service above self."

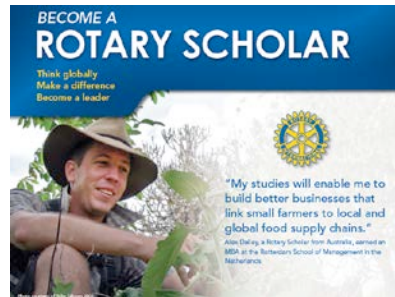
Grant Funds Are Still Available - Deadline Extended, First Come - First Served

Rotary District 5190 still has funds available for District Service Grants on a first come-first served basis. Rotary Foundation Global Grant Scholarships Available

Formerly known as Ambassadorial Scholarships, the new TRF Global Grant Scholarships are available to fund graduate level studies or research in a foreign country for a period of one to four academic years. The studies must be related to one of the Rotary Foundation's Six Areas of Focus: Peace and conflict prevention/resolution; Disease prevention and treatment; Clean water and sanitation; Maternal and child health; Basic education and literacy; and Economic and community development.



Global Scholarships are available to non-Rotarians who are nominated/sponsored by a local Rotary club. The minimum funding from the World Fund is \$15,000 which results in a minimum total award of \$30,000.

Applicants must supply proof of admission to a graduate level program at a university or a letter of invitation to conduct post-

graduate research, either of which would have a direct effect on real community needs in one or more of the six areas of focus, and be sustainable and measurable (i.e. How will the applicants studies support one or more of the areas of focus?).

Global grants must be sponsored by at least one Rotary club or district in the country or geographical area where the grant will take place (primary host sponsor), and at least one or more outside that country or geographical area (international host sponsor).

Your Voice Will Guide Us

The Council on Legislation gives all of us as Rotarians an opportunity to have a voice in how our organization, Rotary International, is governed. It is an exciting opportunity and the time is NOW.

What you can do:

Think about things that might improve our effectiveness as an organization or better meet the needs of our Club.

Create a proposal, either an enactment or a resolution. Enactments seek to change Rotary's constitutional documents (RI Constitution, RI By-Laws, and Standard Rotary Club Constitution). Resolutions express an opinion or make a recommendation to the RI Board; they do not seek to change the constitutional documents.

Discuss proposal with your Club's Board. The Board submits the proposed legislation to the Club for adoption at a regularly scheduled meeting. If the proposed legislation is adopted, it is forwarded to the District with a letter signed by the Club President and Secretary certifying that the Club has adopted the proposal.

The Clubs in the District must then endorse the proposed legislation either during District Conference, or a District Resolutions meeting or if timing deems necessary, as in our case this year, by a ballot-by-mail.

More Than a 5190 Rotarian at a Project Fair

Karen Grosz is a woman who works wonders! She has attended Project Fairs in Ecuador since 2008. Her interest, initiative, dedication and commitment along with that of the Susanville Sunrise Rotary Club have made a difference – let’s look at just three of their projects. This \$19,750 project equipped the Los Lojas Community School with an Operating Microscope for detection of eye disease and use in surgical procedures, in a poor area near Guayaquil, Ecuador. The Guayaquil La Puntilla RC was a strong partner and continues to do beneficial work in the area.

These projects changed me, giving me deeper insight into the basic needs that many people around the world struggle with – like clean water, which most Americans never think about



Children of the Andes

Near San Miguel Bancos, the Susanville Sunrise RC and Quito Norte RC were able to install water purification systems in four local schools for about \$32,000. The majority of people in the area use river water for cooking and washing; this water sometimes contains raw sewage. The students can now drink, wash their hands, and prepare food with clean water.

In yet another project Karen and her fellow Rotarians in the Susanville Sunrise RC and the partner Quito Valle Interoceánico RC, funded equipment, supplies and scholarships for the Children of the Andes School in the Tumbaco Valley.

Elko Rotarians Work Together to Get Projects Done in Elko

The Rotary Club of Elko Desert Sunrise and the Elko Rotary Club are working together to help light up Rotary and their communities. Both clubs have a long tradition of trying to share resources to help get projects done in Northern Nevada and in the last two weeks both clubs completed the Elko Rotary Club's Original Nevada University's Bell project and the Elko Desert Sunrise's Benches for T-Ball project.

The Original Nevada University Bell

Most Nevadans are surprised to discover Nevada's first University wasn't located in Las Vegas or Reno but in Elko. In 1874, just 10 years after the State was admitted into the Union, the University of Nevada was established under the Morrill Act and was first located in what is now the campus of Elko High School. It operated in Elko from 1874 through 1884, when it was re-located to its present site in Reno, Nevada and when the University moved, the bell moved with it to Reno. To commemorate the University's anniversary in 1974, the original University bell was moved back to Elko. With the help of Elko Rotary Club members it was placed in front the Elko High School's 1939 gymnasium where the former University stood. However, after 40 years, the railroad timbers the bell was mounted upon had deteriorated and had become a safety concern for students.

Fortunately Rich Perry, the Elko Rotary Club's president for the fiscal year 2013-14 had the foresight to recognize a wonderful Rotary project and applied for a District 5190 Service Grant to build a more appropriate commemoration of Nevada's first

commitment to high education. Rich approached the Elko Desert Sunrise club for an additional donation of \$1,000 but more importantly used the power of vocational service to enlist Desert Sunrise Rotarian Pedro Ormaza, President of Ormaza Construction, as a key project champion. For the Elko Rotary Club's project chair, he enlisted Rotarian and Regent of Nevada System of Higher Education Kevin Melcher and together the co-chairs were able to secure an additional donation of \$2,500 each from Newmont Mining

Company and Barrick Gold Corporation as well as other donations, donated labor and materials throughout the community. The completed project was officially unveiled on October 22nd with guest speakers President of the University of Nevada Reno, Marc Johnson, and President Mark Curtis of Great Basin College presiding.

Donate and Install 9 New T-Ball Benches

On this project, Elko Desert Sunrise took the lead and with the help of

powerhouse and project chair Rotarian Jean Sloan, applied for a District 5190 Service Grant and

matched the Elko Desert Sunrise and Elko Rotary Club donations of \$4,000, for a total of \$8,000, to replace 4 wooden benches located in the City of Elko Park area designated as T-Ball Field and Coach Pitch Fields. The existing benches were found to be inadequate for the seating of the teams utilizing the fields because they were only 6 feet long, not large enough for 9 players, and were badly worn. The \$8,000 was used to replace the wooden benches at each field with 16-foot long, metal coated industrial grade team benches in Forest Green. One additional 8 foot Bench was purchased and placed behind the museum for seating in the park. Each bench was installed in-ground, secured with concrete and features the word "ROTARY" printed on the backrest. The metal benches will last for generations, requiring little or no maintenance.

Visiting the Rotary Club of Fernley, I heard the director of the Northern Nevada Memorial Cemetery speak to the club about placing wreaths on the grave sites. There are over 5,000 graves sites at this veteran's cemetery. In December 2012, 1,600 wreaths were placed on graves of the fallen soldiers resting in Fernley.

Last year, Bob Lord of the Rotary Club of Sparks led an effort to involve the Rotary Clubs in District 5190 in the *Wreaths Across America* project.

On December 14, 2013 at 9 a.m., over 3,600 wreaths were placed on the grave sites at the Veteran's Memorial Cemetery in Fernley. I was fortunate to be one of the people who attended the patriotic and emotional ceremony, and helped to place wreaths. It is a day I will

never forget. Bob made sure each of us was included and understood the importance of our participation in this very moving event to honor and remember the veterans who had served our country.

It is with great sadness that I report to you that Bob Lord passed away on October 14, 2014. Bob's wish and our goal was that we place a wreath on each of the 5,000 grave sites in Fernley, and I am asking you and your club to help continue this great project, although Bob is not here to lead the way.

We are fortunate that Past President Brian Roberts from the Rotary Club of Fernley has stepped up to lead the Wreaths Across America effort this year. You can contribute in your own name, on behalf of your Rotary Club, or in honor of Bob Lord to support this important event.

WE DID IT WITH BELLS AND WHISTLES

District 5190 held three sessions of our Rotary Eighth Grade Leadership program in the Fall of 2014. Two residential sessions were held at Grizzly Creek Ranch in Portola, CA. One day program (4 days) was held for the Reno and Sparks schools in Sparks, NV. All three sessions were led by Dean and Rochelle Whellams of Sparks, NV. Feedback from students, parents, school administrators and Rotarians were universally positive!

The attached chart shows the history of the REGL program since inception and the breakout of student numbers by session. In 2014 we invited 2 schools (a total of 9 kids) from District 5180. We do this as a goodwill gesture and when we have available seats

that would not be taken by a District 5190 club. Our strategy is to continue to expand the number of participating clubs and schools in our district.

Program delivery:

45 Rotarians serve as REGL Coordinators and provide a Rotary interface for the middle schools.

14 Rotarians and volunteers were Adult Mentors for the 2 Grizzly Creek sessions.

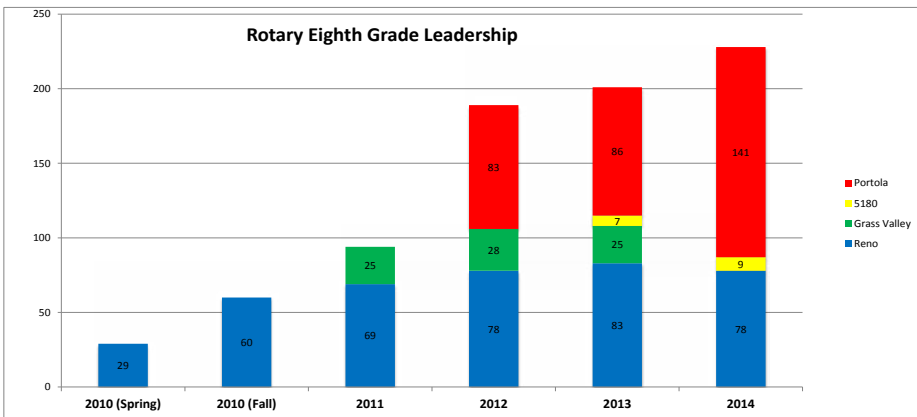
33 RYLA graduates from this summer's RYLA programs volunteered as Junior Counselors.

End Polio Now Radio Hour!

In celebration of World Polio Day, the five Rotary Clubs of Area 4 presented an End Polio Now Radio Hour on October 24th. Local station KNCO donated the time and hosted the show. Thank you KNCO!

Nevada County South's Allen Ostrofe and Grass Valley's Wyn Spiller participated in person, along with three special guests: Dr. Bob Scott, RI Director Elect Brad Howard and Bob Mutchler 'Motorcycle Bob.'



Following a short history of polio eradication, Dr. Bob Scott joined the program via a previously taped interview in which he shared where we are today along with insights into both the challenges and strategies in Pakistan, our most difficult and highly infected area. In addition to polio vaccination efforts, Pakistan's PolioPlus committee is working to build community trust and support via broad based assistance with such things as providing clean water wells, garbage clean up, health camps and resource centers. Dr. Scott is the immediate past Chair of Rotary International's PolioPlus committee, having served from 2006 to June 30, 2014. His leadership and dedication are so very much appreciated!

RIDE Brad Howard also joined via taped interview, sharing his experiences, Rotary's role in the eradication efforts and some of the very early history of our involvement. Brad has led 22 trips to India and six countries from Sub-Saharan Africa, taking more than 1000 Rotarians and guests, giving them the incredible hands-on experience of participating in national or regional immunization days. He shared remarkable stories of experiences in the field as well as how our eradication infrastructure is being used to combat Ebola and other diseases - such an important legacy of polio eradication.

Our final guest was Bob Mutchler, known to many as 'Motorcycle Bob.' Bob, a polio survivor, has been riding his motorcycle with the sole goal of raising awareness of The Rotary Foundation and specifically PolioPlus since 1988. A member and past President of the Rotary Club of Folsom, Bob has spoken around the world, sharing his story and inspiring others to support our polio eradication efforts. In response to a question, Bob shared the importance of immunizing all of our children, including here in the US. The poliovirus travels easily and every unvaccinated child is at risk. Bob is the subject of new book, *From Iron Lung to Iron Butt*, written by Lynda Lahman and available directly from Bob, with autograph, for \$20. All proceeds of the book are going to PolioPlus. We concluded the program with highlights of our five Rotary Clubs' End Polio Now activities, which included being in the streets and shopping centers, raising awareness and collecting funds to *End Polio Now – Make History Today*.
